Does one inch make a difference?

QUESTION: I have a 1997 Ford Expedition with 17inch all-terrain tires. I have four 16 inch summer radials in the garage. Would the one inch difference in the tires hurt anything? This vehicle was also available with 16 inch tires.

ANSWER: Many things would be affected by changing tire size, such as:

Speedometer calibration. Your speedometer would read too fast.

Transmission shift point would feel strange.

3. Fuel economy would be affected.

All of this could be corrected by changing the driven gear on the vehicle speed sensor

in the transmission.

The real issue here is cost. Although the speedo gear is approximately \$12 (plus labor), 16 inch rims list for \$442 EACH. It would be much more economical to buy four 17 inch summer tires than to buy four 16 inch rims and have to change your speedo gears spring and fall. Sell the 16 inch tires and put the money towards new 17 inch tires.







by the humane society, but much rather countless times a day at the hands of small children as well as those who should know better. Personally speaking, I can recall on many occasions intervening and correcting my own children when our family cat Whitey has had his tail pulled, or has been kicked or mauled or otherwise abused by them. Others, undoubtedly, can relate instances of their own when a family cat or dog, has received undeserved rough treatment.

Such abuse and disregard for the life of smaller creatures is not, I would contend, as isolated in its application and implications as some would narrowly conclude. Much to the contrary, the respect or lack of it that we accord to God's smallest creatures inevitably carries over into our relations with, attitudes to and treatment of other people. As it is my intention to further develop this theme, next time I will focus upon respect particularly as it applies to how we are to regard and respond to each and every person as a child of God.
