"I've wanted this for my whole life. It's better than working," Lajeunesse said in an interview on Tuesday.

"Although I still have to prove myself at training camp in September, I know that I'm physically and mentally ready for the OHL."

It was clear very early in Lajeunesse's hockey career that he had a lot of talent. He was points leader for most of the years that he spent in the Acton Sabres minor hockey system and repeated his high scoring ways with both the Halton Hurricanes, the Erin Junior C Shamrocks and for the past two years, the Junior A Georgetown Raiders,

"Ever since I started playing hockey when I was four or five years old I knew that this was what I wanted to do as a job. Playing and practising every day will be perfect," Lajeunesse said, adding that he knew he'd get drafted, it was the where and when that kept he and his family on edge.

"I knew that my skill level wasn't a problem, but I had no idea who might draft me and I'm glad that it's so close to home so my family can come to the games."

Dad Mitch Lajeunesse describes David as a "hardnosed player' who plays better when he's in the thick of things.

"He can be nasty when he needs to be, but he's also a very disciplined player who doesn't retaliate and take penalties but waits until the time is right," Mitch Lajeunesse said in an interview on Tuesday.

"David is a hard-nosed

kid who plays in traffic - the rougher the game gets the better David plays so his strength is offence and toughness, which every coach loves," Lajeunesse senior said, already looking ahead to next year when he predicts Davis will be asked to try out for the NHL

At 6 feet and 200 pounds Lajeunesse said that he was in decent shape, but needs to work on his sprints and running and will spend the summer getting in shape to be able to "make the jump speed-wise" from Junior A play.

If he's signed by Kitchener after training camp Lajeunesse, currently a Grade 11 student at Bishop Reding High School would be billeted with a Kitchener family. He would attend high school during the day and spend almost all of the rest of his time playing hockey.

Lajeunesse is represented by Cooper Sports Management that recruited him last year.
