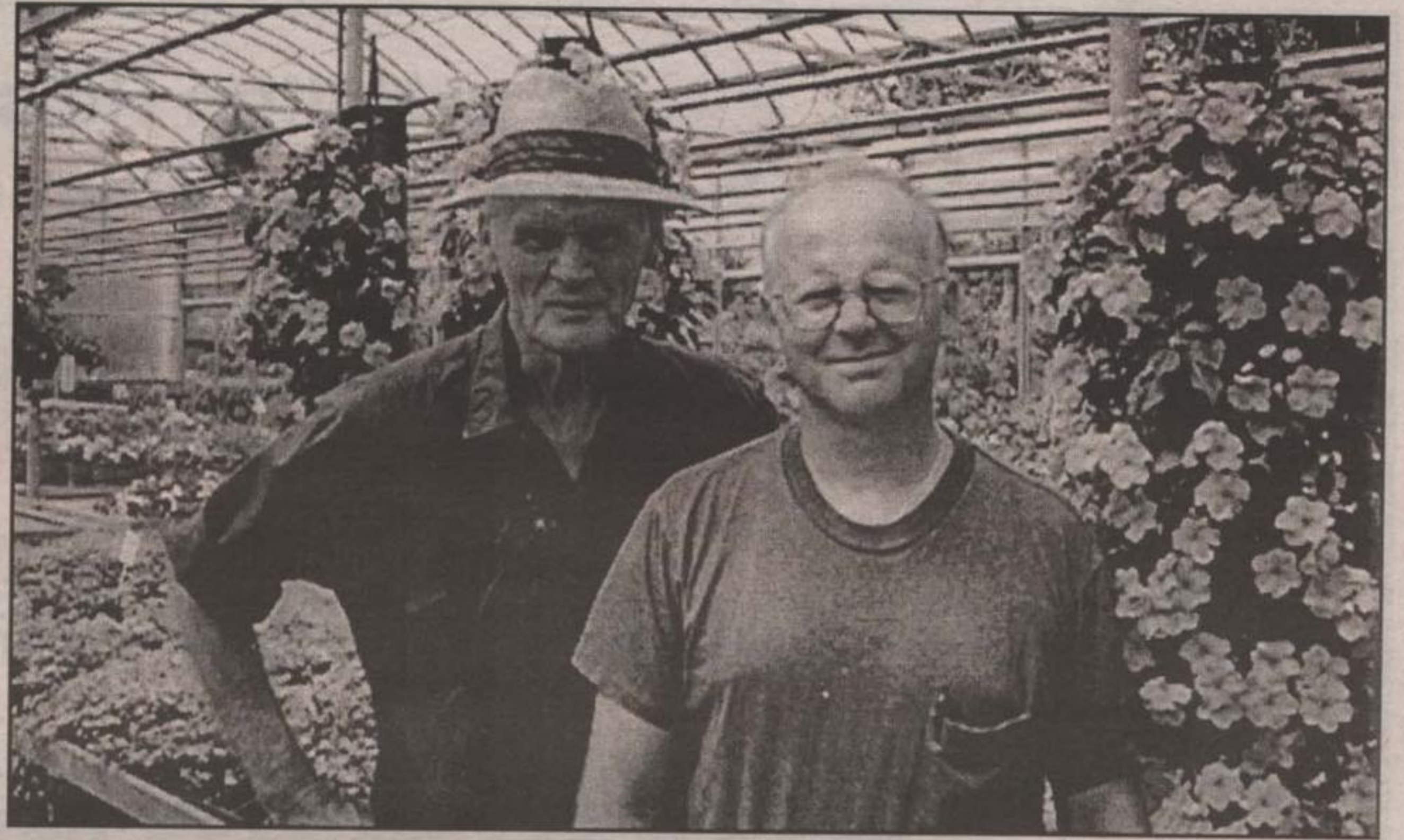

Red means STOP

Although the wording of some warning lights on the instrument cluster of a vehicle may vary from one manufacturer to another, most key symbols and colours are universal. An illuminated red light is telling you something requires immediate attention.

The illuminates when the oil pressure falls below normal range. Shut the engine off immediately.

The illuminates when the battery is not charging properly.

BRAKE is normally shows up when the parking brake is engaged. It also indicates a low brake fluid level.

is to remind you to fasten your seatbelt.

A check engine or service engine code indicates that the P.C.M. (engine computer) is detecting a fault in the engine or transmission operation. As with any yellow light, this indicates you should proceed with caution. Something is in need of service.

Other yellow lamps may include A.B.S., air bag, coolant, oil or washer fluid levels. Some vehicles also use green lamps for voluntary controls such as cruise control or overdrive off. These are just reminders that a system is in use.
