tion couldn't save the old arena which a structural engineering report estimated would cost \$665,000. One estimate of \$30,000 to replace the handicap ramp was astonishing, he said. If it was given to a local contractor at that price he would think he had "died and gone to heaven."

Dr. George Elliott and Vic Bristow, both members of Heritage Acton, also spoke briefly reiterating both the need for the old arena and the desirability of saving it from demolition. It was pointed out Heritage Acton had the knowledge and the ability to issue tax reduction receipts for funds donated to save the arena.

Mayor Marilyn Serjeantson, the only politician at the outdoor meeting, outlined the Town's position. She pointed out the Town had hired a professional engineer to appraise the condition of the old arena because they were concerned about the public's safety.

"We are trying to do what is best for the community," Serjeantson said, noting Acton has the newest public buildings in Halton Hills (new arena and fire hall).

The mayor said she supported the initiative to save the arena. "If you can do it ... great," she said. "We are trying to make things work for the benefit of the Town."

Several citizens questioned the Town's motives and whether the overall plan for the park would be affected if the arena was left standing. The mayor said the Town was flexible and could accommodate whatever is best for the community.

Tyler said it wasn't necessary to make all the repairs at once, only enough to make it safe for the public. Insurance? He said he knew of an insurance company who would insure the building for \$1,000 to enable repairs to start and double that when it was fit for public use.

Once a committee is formed, he asked, would the Town give them adequate time to develop an alternative to demolition? We'll see what the committee comes up with, the mayor replied.

"Before you tear it down, give us a chance," Tyler pleaded.

One man said the Town really doesn't need to set aside \$130,000 to demolish the old arena.

"I'll just get in touch with my Amish friends in St. Jacobs. They'll tear it down for nothing and clean up to the last nail... and erect it in St. Jacobs," he said.

Staff also heard party participants were charged \$20 each at the gate.

Kri said he had not received any complaints about noise but his contract with Lazic made Lazic liable for "any damages or fines" resulting from the event.

Kri, who is known by his neighbours to hold a large party at his farm every August, joked he's "too old for that any more".

"The party probably wasn't supposed to get that big, but if it got that big we'll have to have a talk about donating some of the money (Lazic) raised to a local charity," Kri said.

John Tse of Halton Hills bylaw enforcement department said police called him about the party and he notified both the clerk and the

mayor. The fire chief had already visited the site around 6 p.m. and discussed control with police, Tse said. Their decision was to provide a very visible presence by stopping cars both entering and leaving the event.

During discussion at council Monday Coun. Rick Bonnette questioned whether toilet facilities had been available since lack of them would create a health issue. Staff said public health inspectors could not be contacted to investigate that Saturday.

Since the event was on private property there was no way to prevent it, says bylaw enforcement officer Ron Stein. Unless further investigation reveals an infraction under the noise bylaw or the need for a special event permit, the town won't lay charges.


