# Film shoot policy approved by council

Film companies wanting to shoot in Halton Hills on public property will have to pay a \$500 daily permit production fee as part of a new film production policy approved by council.

With Halton Hills becoming a popular location for film productions council increased the daily fee by 500 per cent and updated interim film guidelines, designed to maximise public safety and minimize both community disruption and the Town's

exposure to liability.

Ward 2 Councillor Kathy Gastle suggested that the \$500 daily fee should be decreased and that the Town should negotiate with production companies for improvements and amenities. Georgetown councillor Jane Fogal argued that there are no benefits or spin-offs to the Town from production shoots and that they are "pretty much disruptive" and that the daily fee should be higher.

Acton councillor Norm Elliott cautioned that it was too soon to be talking about

"increasing the increase" and predicted there will be beneficial spin-offs, like there are in Toronto, known as "Hollywood North."

"It (film shoots) is one of the largest, perhaps fastest largest, growing sources of income and revenue in Toronto and it's spilling off in these areas...and what we're trying to do is be as receptive to this type of industry as possible. Perhaps the natural beauty of Halton Hills will be utilized more and more," Elliott said.

The application for a film shoot in Halton Hills in-

cludes provisions for sufficient advance notice, crowd control, consideration of pedestrians, traffic and emergency vehicles, proof of adequate insurance, notification of area residents, measures to ensure public safety and payments to encourage cost recovery.

Besides the daily fee the Town recovers the cost of handling film production requests by charging rental fees for parks, rooms, signs, equipment and by requiring building permits fees for stages and tents.

## Site plan for Park-Lincoln approved

As long as Halton Hills gets an updated site plan it has no objections to the Niagara Escarpment Commission issuing a development permit to Park Lincoln-Mercury Sales which plans to build a new car dealership on the east side of Highway 7 in the Henderson's Corners rural cluster, north of its current location at 22 Side Road and Highway 7.

Although Park Lincoln first applied for site plan approval in 1989, permits have lapsed over the years when construction didn't occur because of market conditions and the pending reconstruc-

tion of Highway 7 to four lanes from the Trafalgar north intersection to Georgetown.

The proposed 22,000 square foot development includes a car dealership with a showroom, offices, repair facilities, outdoor parking and signage.
