Province's tax plan hurts

Regional Chairman Joyce Savoline reacted strongly to the Province's announcement at Queen's Park last week to set mandatory "caps" on property tax increases for commercial/industrial properties in Ontario.

"This change of policy is unbelievable!" "We are in the tenth month of our 1998 budget and a week away from the last tax installment due date and the Province has sent Regional Council back to the drawing board."

The chairman noted that, for Halton the Provincial plan means that total business taxes will be \$2 million higher than++nder Halton's plan. Savoline went on, "The Provincial change means that the Halton's business rebates are null and void."

"Minister Eves is mistaken when he says that municipalities did not take advantage of the tools provided by the Province," Savoline stated. She reported that the Regions of Halton, Hamilton-Wentworth and Ottawa-Carleton all implemented

measures to moderate the impact of CVA. Halton adopted a three year phasein plan for residential homeowners and apartments, an enhanced tax deferral plan for low income seniors and low income disabled persons and a four-year rebate program for businesses.

Savoline also said "Halton has been a leader in property tax reform since we implemented the first and only region-wide reassessment in the Greater Toronto Area in 1996."

Savoline indicated that

she contacted Minister Eves twice to request that Halton be exempt from the new legislation. In her letters to the minister, the chairman noted that she had the support of the four Chambers of Commerce in Halton. The four presidents were unanimous in expressing their concern about the provincial announcement.

Chairman Savoline concluded that she expected the Minister of Finance to respond to Halton's concerns and exempt the Region from this most recent policy.




