Fire destroys IGA store

Fire completely destroyed the Georgetown IGA store Sunday morning and a firefighter who fought the flames had his leg broken. The store is located on Guelph Street, which is part of Highway 7 between Maple and Mountainview avenues.

An alarm was called in shortly before 5:30 a.m. and flames were shooting out the roof near the front of the building when firefighters arrived.

Firefighters were there only a few minutes when part of the burning ceiling collapsed on Bruce Morrison and a fellow brigade member. Morrison was taken to Georgetown hospital with a broken leg. He has been on the force less than a year. The other man received only minor injuries and was able to resume fighting the fire.

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Ask public's help to clear hydrants of snow

Halton Hills fire chief Bill Cunningham is appealing to the public for help to clear fire hydrants because of the winter's heavy snowfalls.

"The chief is asking the public to shovel out around hydrants especially in the residential areas, enough so we can locate them quickly in case of an emergency," says department spokesman Brian Ellsworth. "We have the hydrants all marked on the maps but in case of a fire we need to be able to find them immediately and we can't under these snowbanks."

While fire department and region staff realize they can't demand public assistance,

they hope people will understand the reason for the request and co-operate.

"We're just asking they dig out enough so we can see the hydrants," Ellsworth says. "If they shovel enough so we could get a hose on, that would be really great. But just enough so we can find them will do."

Halton Region north area maintenance supervisor Greg Ellis said his staff are doing their best to keep hydrants accessible around schools and hospitals but the snow keeps coming as fast as they can clear things.

"We also try to do the ones on arterial roads where

there are no residences near by," he says. "But if we get a watermain break - and we've had a number of them this winter - then we have to shift over to that as a priority."

Especially in the north where most firefighters are volunteers, they just haven't got sufficient manpower to clear all the hydrants, Ellis says, so his people work on the task as well. But even that isn't enough this winter.

Seniors needing help to shovel their hydrants are invited to call Ellis at Halton Region (853-0501) for assistance.

"We'll do our best to get around to them," Ellis says.

Snow bylaw problem for bylaw officer

Although snow removal is a major concern for town workers, no one is getting too heavy handed about enforcing parking or obstruction regulations, says town bylaw enforcement officer Ron Stein.

There are bylaws restricting parking on snow routes between Nov. 15 and April 15 and those are enforced if necessary, he says.

However the prohibition on shoveling or blowing snow onto roads while clear-

ing driveways is usually not a problem. The town engineer does the enforcing but a few words with offenders is usually sufficient to avoid future problems.

Stein acknowledges it is illegal to put snow from driveways and parking lots onto roads but says the local bylaw deals with the issue under obstructing roads.


"We've had problems with a few commercial operators plowing parking lots onto streets," he says. "But usu-

ally all it takes is a few words when it's a private citizen. They just don't think or don't realize they are causing a problem for drivers. Once we warn them, it doesn't usually happen again. But we do have the option of charging them under town bylaws if neces-
