'No mail' blues for rural family

Neither flat denials, frustrating bureaucrats or so far empty assurances will stop a rural Acton resident from trying to get her mail, even though a Canada Post official dismisses her complaints about poor service as "unfounded."

Since July, when a new sub-contractor underbid several long-time Acton rural mail carriers for two rural delivery routes, this Sixth Line resident, who doesn't want to be identified, and four other families who use the same rural mail box, have had sporadic mail delivery.

The resident accused the Ottawa-based master contractor, who sub-contracts out her rural route, of taking the money but not producing

ticked off. They're not fol-

lowing through with their contractual obligations to deliver the mail but they're still getting paid," she said, adding that it's rare to see the mail carrier's car tracks or footprints at the group mail boxes so she's convinced the poor service isn't due to a lack of mail to be delivered.

"I had to drive a cheque to Georgetown because it wasn't picked up from my mail box on time. We haven't received the phone bill and it's already due and my husband's pay stub for last week hasn't arrived yet and I can't do my banking until it arrives," the frustrated resident said, adding that newspapers and flyers often arrive too late to be of any good.

In an interview on Monday, Canada Post media relations spokesman Tom Creech said after checking with the superintendent of the Georgetown post office and with the rural carrier that, "based on our examination of the situation there doesn't appear to be a prob-


"It's sort of the word of the contractor versus the word of the individual, of our customer, and that's a tough one," Creech said as he promised to look further into the complaints.

ice was no better. After five days of no mail, 14 pieces of mail arrived on Tuesday, including a letter mailed from Acton January 29 and two letters from Guelph, postmarked January 28.
