Expect dig to yield new information

"The Rife Site" is a term making its debut in Halton's heritage circles. Located in the former township of Nassagaweya, this archaeological site is expected to yield new information on the history of our native peoples.

Dr. William D. Finlayson, Director of the London Museum of Archaeology, will lead the expedition. Finlayson has conducted archaeological research on the Iroquoian occupation of the Crawford Lake area for the past 31 years. He is well known for his work in the discovery and reconstruction of the Iroquoian village at Crawford Lake, and published a four-volume study in 1998.

For the first time ever, the Museum is inviting members of the public to join in the discovery and take part in the

excavation of the site. To help raise the funds needed for the dig the Museum is offering three different Field Excavation and Laboratory Research Programs for a fee. Orientation, training, field trips, lab work, and meals are offered in the program packages. Archaeologists and other professional staff supervise the site. Participants stay at nearby Mohawk Inn or at local campgrounds.

The Ridge Site was an Iroquoian village occupied (by "proto-Huron" Middleport people) between 1444 and 1474.

Brian engages people with his bright blue eyes, responsive personality and exuberant giggle. He has wavy brown hair, an oval face and full, round cheeks. He is a happy and patient five-year-old from a Roman Catholic background.

Brian enjoys music, toys that have sound and light vibration and playing on the trampoline. He is loveable and demonstrative and likes physical contact. With the help of an Education Assistant, Brian recently completed his first year at Junior Kindergarten in a special needs classroom. While he is becoming more confident in his school environment, Brian needs a lot of encouragement to develop skills.

Although he has taken his first independent steps, Brian uses a wheelchair to assist with transportation. He has been diagnosed with Cerebral Palsy, is considered legally blind and responds minimally to sound. He also has mild seizures which medication controls, and is fed through a tube.

Brian is able to develop trusting and fulfilling relationships, which helps him to be more adventurous and exploring. He would respond well to an affectionate family that has a lot of time to spend with him.
