The 16-year-old, grade 11student from Acton received the award at the Pipers' and Pipe Band Society Highland Ball recently in St. Catharines, capping off a great season that included a first place finish, five secondplace finishes, one third-place and one fourth-place finish.

"I was kind of, sort of surprised to win - I knew it was going to be really close because it was between me and another boy - we actually tied - and I didn't know how well he did while I was away at the World Pipe Band championships in Scotland," Devon said in a recent interview.

Devon, a member of the Milton-based MacDonald Caledonia Juvenile Pipe Band for the past two years, has been drumming for four years - three of them competitively and almost every adjudicator this summer commented on Devon's great potential.

"My Mom has Scottish ancestors and my Dad used to play the drums in a band and I just thought that it was interesting and different and I thought that I'd give it a go," Devon said, when asked what drew her to the drums.

While the summer competitive season is a busy time for Devon, she's busy now memorizing new scores over the winter for next season. The band practices once a week for two hours, and Devon is expected to practice

for a minimum one hour per day, and has one lesson each week to maintain her competitive form. The Champion Supreme award will force Devon to compete at the Grade 3 level - against older competitors next season.

Devon, who shows no shyness or stage fright while performing, says the drumming is a "big hobby that takes up a lot of time" but she is also involved with ballet, basketball, volleyball and wants to join a proposed girls' hockey team at Acton High school.

"I get a real feeling of pride when I play - it really makes me feel good," Devon said, adding she may pursue drumming as a profession, possibly as an instructor.

The largest venue Devon has competed in so far was with the MacDonald-Caledonia Juvenile Band at the World Pipe Band competition this past summer in Glasgow, Scotland. The band placed fifth in their category

"It was nerve wracking. There were 211 bands - it was huge but it was a great experience," Devon said, adding the next challenge is for the band to make it to the 2000 World Championships.

Devon said there was a time during her first year when she quit with the frustration, but she couldn't stay away.

"I missed it after two months - the pipes have a weird way of getting in your head."


Welfare fraud conviction

A Halton Hills woman has been sentenced to one year in jail, to be served as a conditional sentence, plus three years probation for welfare fraud of \$10,022.

Terry Lynn Blanchard appeared in Superior Court in Milton on Nov. 23 and pled guilty to defrauding Halton Social and Community Services of \$10,022 in welfare assistance between Oct. 1, 1994 and Aug. 20, 1995. She admitted residing with her spouse

and father of her child on 15 Sideroad, Milton, while collecting welfare as a sole support parent during that time.

Blanchard is not to apply for welfare assistance while residing with Donald MacDonald Jr. or any other adult for four years. The court also ordered restitution of \$10,022. Assistant Crown Attorney Leo McGuigan indicated to the court that the accused had five previous fraud convictions.
