## Former Acton children are killed in 401 accident

Many prayers are being said in Acton for a former local family whose two children were killed in a car crash on Saturday on the 401 in Cambridge.

Thomas, 11, and Meredith Moon, 8, were killed when a transport truck loaded with steel rear-ended their family car as they travelled to Peterborough for a family Christ-


mas party.

Sandra Moon's condition has been upgraded to serious from critical in the intensive care unit of Hamilton General Hospital where she is being taken off drugs that induced a coma following surgery for a head injury. Dad, Geoff Moon, 41, waits by her bedside with the heart-wrenching task of telling his wife their children are dead.

The Moons lived in Acton approximately six years ago until they transferred to Kitchener where Sandra worked as regional manager of a local insurance company.

Geoff Moon, a devoted stay-at-home father, was chair of the Acton Blood donor clinic and an active member in the Red Cross, a tradition he continued in Kitchener.

Funeral arrangements have not been announced.

traffic in the area, as a "very scary situation" said the threat of a doubled fine isn't slowing speeding motorists.

"If they start to fine people then the safety zones might work but the police are short-handed and they can't be here all the time and as long as the police aren't here, people will speed and I worry about the children crossing to St. Joseph's," Gibson said.

St. Joseph's principal Jim McGerragle said he doesn't know if the CSZ was improving traffic safety but supports the idea that increased fines would work as a deterrent.

Halton police Staff Sergeant Ron Welsh said the CSZs haven't been in existence long enough to assess their effectiveness, but will be a deterrent if the public is educated about them.

While enforcement is the key to slowing traffic, Welsh said no additional dollars were set aside to increase police time in the CSZ.

"I guess it's like any initiative where you have to monitor what's going on there on a constant basis is you're going to get the whole picture and I think that's probably the problem -our resources don't allow for that," Welsh said on Monday.

The effectiveness of CSZs will be assessed in this spring.

A Hitchcock Children's Trust Fund has also been established and donations can be made through Acton's MacKinnon Funeral Home.






