#### Out of the ashes

The Town and mayor will bring whatever "pressure" they can bring to bare to persuade the Credit Valley Conservation (CVC) to allow the Georgetown Little Theatre to rebuild in Stewarttown after its building was razed by fire in March last year.

Ward 2 Councillor Kathy Gastle said she was "saddened" that CVC won't allow the theatre group to rebuild on its Stewarttown property because it's in the flood plain and said the decision was "somewhat unfair."

"We all know that the building was there in the 1800s and there are still buildings existing in what is classified as flood plain and I just wonder if Council, or yourself (Mayor Serjeantson), could put any pressure on the CVC to reconsider their decision." Gastle said recently.

Georgetown Little Theatre officials are currently working with the Town to find a suitable 1.5-acre parcel of land to build a new private studio/ theatre, preferably in Georgetown South. Town councillors asked staff to meet with Little Theatre offi-

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cials to discuss current and future property requirements and report back to Council.

#### Canine costs rise

It'll cost you an extra 5 per cent - \$25- to renew your dog licence as of January 1, as the Town attempts to balance the canine control budget. While the Town has been working on an enhanced dog licensing program - with a user fee concept - for the past 18 months in a effort to make the canine control program pay for itself, the projected 2000 budget includes a net loss of approximately \$30,000 with the increased fee, \$50,000 without it.

Staff said the \$25 renewal fee - the first increase in nine years - is about average compared to neighbouring municipalities. The annual fee for a new licence, without a microchip, is \$30 and the lifetime fee is \$40 for a dog with a microchip for easy identifica-

Kuiack voted against the increase, noting there are approximately 1,000 unlicenced dogs in Halton Hills.

We had difficulty enough getting the amount of dogs licensed this year for \$20, and I don't think we're going to get that many more if we up it five bucks more." Kuiack said recently
