



Local politicians say Acton the loser

While Acton politicians don't want to be pushed into restructuring, they known change is coming and one is suggesting talks about an alliance with Milton.

At the January Halton Council meeting there will be a Notice of Motion from Burlington's mayor and an Oakville councillor for Halton to begin a study and public consolation process on amalgamation and restructuring before the province does it to them.

Acton Councillor Norm
Elliott resents what he calls

Elliott said Acton "pretty much accepted" regional government in 1973, taking what the province handed out.

bitching about regional government 25 years later, maybe they should start thinking about what they're doing now when the government is talking about even larger changes to the political system in Ontario," Elliott said as he accused the public of being apathetic about what the Tory government "has been allowed to get away with as far as gutting our democratic system in Ontario."

"The grassroots input from local people at local levels is going to be eradicated and it will turn the system into city states with career politicians running the system." Elliott predicted.

A suggestion from the Oakville councillor that Acton could become part of Guelph is "ludicrous" Elliott said, asking why Acton would

want to align with a region that has no money.

Acton Councillor Rick Bonnette Rick Bonnette said the restructuring issue is wide reaching and he's "nervous" after hearing comments from some south Halton politicians.

"One said we were getting caved up pretty good and Georgetown can go to Brampton and Acton can go to Guelph or we could have two cities in Halton. Don't the people of Ward 2 have any say?" Bonnette asked.

"The province will want Halton to do something and it may even turn out to be the City of Halton and there will be a lot of debate before we get to that," Bonnette said, adding the Region has been the model of effective government.

Acton Councillor Clark Somerville agrees that the biggest issue facing municipal politicians this year is restructuring and asks what's wrong with the "whiners in Burlington."

"Some of the politicians in the south want our industrial area at the 401, but they don't want the rest of us. I don't think so," Somerville said.

"If there's going to be restructuring in the Region, I think realistically the smartest thing for us to do is to talk to Milton about the City of North Halton, because a city of Halton would kill us when it came to representation."

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
