# Arena mural depicts Acton's sports heritage

The first of two murals depicting Acton's cultural, sports and historical heritage is in progress at the Acton arena and is expected to be completed by week's end.

Last weekend, artists Michelle Loughery and Liz Allardice of Vernon, B.C. began drawing and painting their design on the wall opposite the arena entrance.

It has been blocked into three sections. On the left is a picture of the Acton Citizens' Band; on the right is Henderson's Pond. Both of these will be in sepia tones "like an old photograph," Loughery says, while the centre panel, done in full colour, will show hockey, lacrosse and baseball players in authentic uniforms of an earlier era.

Later this spring the two artists will return to do the outdoor mural on the wall behind the Mill/Main Parkette. That one will depict commercial and industrial sites from Acton's past, says Business Improvement Area manager, Janis Fread. Work on that mural cannot begin until repointing and repairs to the wall have been completed.

The idea for murals was raised by the BIA and others, then supported by Heritage Halton Hills, which did some fundraising for the project and applied for grants for it.

Halton Hills Recreation director Joy Thompson says the two murals are expected to cost more than \$17,000. The

project has already received a federal grant of \$8,670 from the Millenium Bureau of Canada, but no word has been received yet on an application to the Trillium Foundation. Donations have also been received from the Acton Rotary Club and promised by a number of local businesses.

Thompson said the choice of artists to do the murals was made by a group of community representatives called the Acton Heritage Mural Committee. They also decided what themes and what individual facets of Acton's history should appear in the murals.

Loughery says she feels a responsibility to portray details accurately when she does a heritage mural for a community. She has already

completed 46 murals, most of them in her native British Columbia. She has done one in Japan, one in Alberta and this is her first in Ontario. She has also been hired for a project in Georgetown and is being considered for one in Toronto to do with the Olympics.

Although she has no formal art training, she was raised in an artisan-oriented family and taught herself the techniques she uses in her work now while she was administrator for an art centre in Sparwood.

Allardice began working with Loughery as a high school student, continued their association during her training at the Alberta College of Art and Design, then returned about a year ago when she graduated.
