Town Digest

Prestige 401 corridor

No "Big Box" stores thank you. No truck depots and no outside storage. The Town's 401-Steeles Avenue industrial corridor between James Snow Parkway and Winston Churchill Boulevard is an up-market development, and now all it needs to become a reality is water from Lake Ontario.

While the Town works with Halton to quickly bring water to the new industrial corridor, it will also work with Hornby and Fifth Line residents who now live surrounded by industrial, not agricultural, land.

Rural cluster designations have been eliminated south of Steeles and the land north of Steeles Avenue - where they may be pressure to develop - will be looked at more closely, along with making Hornby a hamlet, not a rural cluster. St. Steven's Anglican Church on Steeles will be buffered from development by 15 metres of berms and landscaping, about half the distance it wanted to prevent from being swallowed up by industrial development.

Development of the corridor over 15 years is expected to create 5,000 jobs and generate \$60 million in property taxes.

New Town position

Marketing land in the 401 corridor will be an important job for the Town's soon-to-be hired economic development officer - a four-year contract position Town said shows how serious it is about a new strategy for economic development, tourism and marketing.

Economic development is seen as a key building block for the Town's future and a way to pay for the high quality of life local residents expect. Creating more local jobs to become more self-reliant is one of the main strategies of the Town's recently ap-

proved community strategic plan, the blueprint for the future.

The economic development work plan for the rest of the year includes a business retention strategy, marketing of the 402 corridor, streamlining development processes and downtown revitalization in Acton and Georgetown.

What's up, doc?

Acton Councillor Rick Bonnette hopes the Town hears "sooner, not later" about the Town's chances of getting help attracting new family physicians to town.

"We're just keeping our fingers crossed that we will be recognized as an underserved community," Bonnette said on Sunday. A month ago a Ministry of Health and Long Term Care official said the Town's data and information asking for designation was being studied.

No Acton doctor is accepting new patients and two doctors are reaching retirement age and Bonnette said he couldn't imagine Halton Hills wouldn't get the designation because the situation is similar in Georgetown.

The designation makes it more attractive for doctors to relocate to an area by offering incentives and also allows the Town access to graduating classes and physician job fairs.

On a related issue....

Still no word on a new location for the Acton ambulance bay and Bonnette hopes they find a new location before the current spot at the Becker's plaza gets flooded out, again.

"The hired a consultant, if you will, just to survey what potentials there are in the town," Bonnette said, adding the existing location was flooded out four times last year and is a "pit, it's deplorable."

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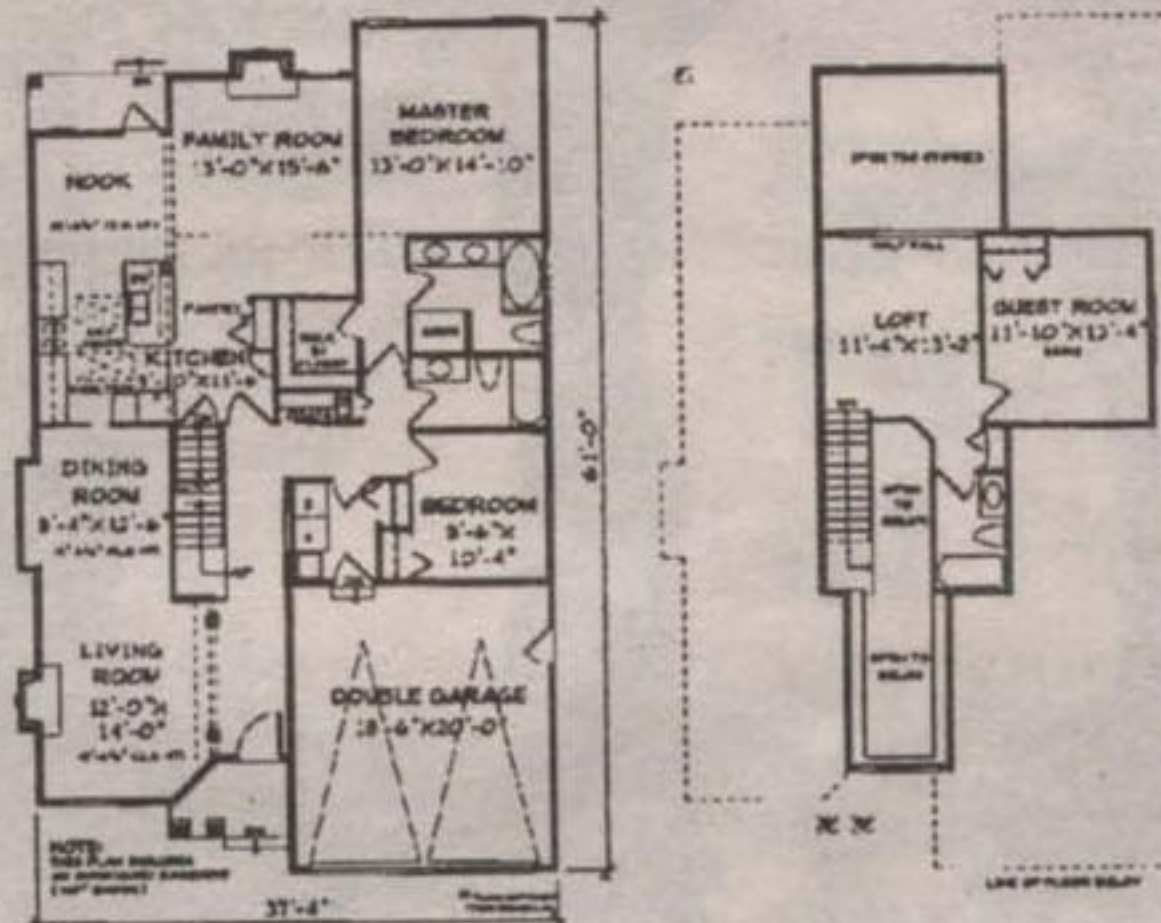
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Rancher with loft boasts many features

A fashionable exterior design features a combination of stucco and horizontal siding enhanced by stone veneer around the living room window and on tapered columns, and by tudor boards inside the gables.
