Acton athletes get municipal awards

Eight athletes from Acton were among the honourees at the Town's municipal awards ceremony on Monday, designed to publicly congratulate and thank the groups and individuals whose achievements brought recognition and honour to Halton Hills last year.

The Halton Hills Peewee Bulldogs, including Acton players Kyle Fellows, Joseph Luty, Tyler Holmes, Brendan Moffat, Eric Lavallee and Sean Nellis, won four of six games to earn a bronze medal at the provincial lacrosse championships last August. The Thurston Machine Peewee Bulldogs also claimed the Zone eight championship during their successful season.

Two of four local teams in the Halton Hills Girls' Softball Association made it to the provincial grand championship last year and both came away with medals.

The Halton Hills Squirt Hawks won four of five games to capture the silver medal in the Tier I championship. Acton's Amanda Schroeder plays on that team that earned six medals at the eight tournaments they played in.

The Halton Hills Bantam Hawks – including Acton's Meghann Williams, were honoured for their Tier II silver medal at the provincial championships. The Bantam Hawks

Also had a great season last year, winning seven medals – including gold – in tournament play.

Acton's John Eddolls was honoured for the hard work and dedication that earned him a berth on the National Life Saving team that competed recently at the world championship in Australia. Team Canada was seventh overall and John had two top-

eight finishes at the world championships. He set two Canadian records and was part of a relay team that also set Canadian records. John is the summer assistant manager at the Acton Indoor Pool and Prospect Park wading pool.

All of the recipients received a pen and a certificate.

Zions creating village to recall Bannockburn

Peter Zions Construction and Pat Stuart Developments are creating a permanent reminder of an historic Esquesing name with the erection of a subdivision named Bannockburn at Highway 7 and the Fourth Line, east of Acton.

The Battle of Bannockburn freed Scotland from English domination in 1314, making it an important historical name to Scots. Thus the area's mainly Scottish settlers chose it as the name for their school section when they erected their first building in the mid 1800s.

Later that building was replaced by a one-room brick school at a slightly different location and continued to serve the community until the early 1960s. It is now a private home.

Zions, whose family attended the brick school, and his partner plan to build 17 homes on lots stretching back from Highway 7 in an arc around Coles Court.

Included in this plan are three designs which look like an old school, an old

church and a traditional town hall.

These "historical recreations" are the source of the term "Village" of Bannockburn since no actual village ever existed there. Home plans for the site have been named after two early settlers, the Gordons and the Manns, as well as more recent owners, the Coles and Somerville families.

Zions got the idea for these special facades after renovating an old church at Marsville. He found many people want to live in "a new space that is rooted in history."

The development is holding an open house this weekend to kick off sales of the lots and offer potential buyers their first glimpse of the houses planned for the site.

Vehicle Impoundment

Any driver found driving a vehicle on a highway who has been convicted of a Criminal Code offence (Impaired Driving, Dangerous Driving, etc.) and whose driver's licence is under suspension pursuant to Section 41 or 42 of the Ontario Highway Traffic Act is subject to having the vehicle which they are found driving impounded for a minimum of 45 days.

This vehicle impoundment is mandatory and it matters not who the vehicle belongs to.

It is now the vehicle owner's responsibility to ensure that the driver of their vehicle is not under suspension. The owner of the vehicle is also responsible for the towing and the impoundment fees which for 45 days will work out to between \$900 and \$1,100. The suspended driver faces a fine of between \$5,000 and \$50,000.
