## Faster ambulance response times in Acton

Staffing the Acton ambulance depot around the clock has shaved 1:04 minutes off emergency response times and further service enhancements are expected when Halton takes over responsibility for land ambulance services from the province on August 16.

At a meeting yesterday (Wednesday), Halton Council was expected to endorse a committee recommendation to hire 28 more paramedics with an annualized cost of \$1.4 million, in addition to the 108 being offered jobs with the new Halton ambulance division. Forty of the new employees will have advanced care training – a level of service not now available in Acton, Georgetown and Milton.

"Now we'll have equality across the Region in level of service to help improve response times," said John Pereira, Halton's manager of land ambulance services, adding legislation requires Halton to meet 1996 re-

sponse times of 13:07 minutes for urgent, high priority calls.


"With the introduction of the additional 12 hours (of ambulance service) in Acton, there was a reduction in 1999 to 12:03 minutes, so actually, of all the communities in the Region, Halton Hills has succeeded to reduce response times," Pereira said.

Over half of the new ambulance recruits will be full-time, 38 part-time and 21 volunteers positions will be available to recognize the importance of the volunteer ambulance

attendants who work in north Halton with Halton Hills Ambulance Services.

Halton is still waiting to hear if the province will pick up 50 per cent of the ambulance costs, which would be over the \$3.4 million budgeted by 17 per cent with the additional 28 paramedics.

Pereira said Halton is still "actively working" with the Town and other agencies to find a new home for the existing Acton ambulance depot, located at the back of the Becker's store.

A dream officially became a reality in Acton on Tuesday when the Off The Wall youth centre officially opened its doors on Mill Street.

The drop in. beside Halton Hills Community Support and Information (HHCSI) office. has been hugely popular since its unofficial opening in June. and the ribbon cutting is the culmination of three years of hard work.

As she greeted guests to the official opening. HHCSI executive director Rosslyn Dowell said no one can help your make dreams come true if you don't share them and recounted how HHCSI staffer Elly Tuitman had come to her with the dream of a youth drop in

Tuitman said the drop in idea started with a meeting of Acton parents concerned about drug use.

"I looked around the room and said someone should start a youth centre because the parents were having trouble dealing with their teenagers and the teens didn't have anything to do themselves and were acting out." Tuitman said, adding it took a lot of community partnerships to make the centre a reality

In an interview before the opening. Dowell said HHCSI now offers cradle to grave or "womb to tomb" service in Acton with addition of the youth component. Dowell said the centre was built by the community of Halton

Hills "brick by brick."

"More than 90 individuals donated more than 1.300 hours of volunteer time just to renovate the space."

# Expect more of them for four months

Acton can expect fourmonths of additional truck traffic beginning July 17 when an "ugly" detour reroutes traffic while Trafalgar Road is closed for reconstruction from the Silvercreek - Highway 7 intersection. north to Ballinafad/32 Side Road.

Heavy trucks heading north on Trafalgar will detour to Acton and use Wallace Street to get Highway 25 to head north to Highway 24 and then back to Trafalgar Road.

Local traffic will detour to the Eighth Line between 27 Side Road and 32 Side Road.

Motorists can expect additional delays in early August as the province begins the multi-million dollar reconstruction of the Highway 7-Trafalgar Road interchange to improve safety.

Several knolls will be flattened in a 3.4-kilometre section of Trafalgar Road from just north of the Highway 7 intersection to Ballinafad/32 Side Road.

Halton construction supervisor Gord Robbins said traffic safety would be improved on the road that hasn't had major repairs for 25 years.

Total reconstruction includes basically taking all the dips and hills away so the
