## Experimental bomb rocks Lasby Lane

No damage was done but Lasby Lane residents got a big bang - probably from a neighbour- Saturday night when someone set off an explosive device in the middle of their street.

Halton Regional Police Det. Larry Brassard said their explosive disposal unit found the smoking remains of an unsophisticated, hand-thrown object in the middle of the street when they were called to the scene after 9:30 p.m.

The object was like "a homemade hand grenade", he said. While neighbours are understandably concerned, police investigators suspect the item was likely an experiment, possibly by a youth, try-

ing to determine if he could make a bomb.

"Directions for making these things are easily accessible on the Internet so it's no trick (for a kid) to get the information. We're investigating but this one was quite crude and totally different from the bomb in Norval."

Police dismantled that bomb after it

wound up in a truck in Guelph recently. While that situation is still under investigation, police see no connection between the two incidents.


#### Blood Clinic here Aug. 10

A single donation of blood can save as many as four lives, says Canadian Blood Services (CBS), which is running a blood clinic at Acton Legion on Thursday, Aug. 10 from 4 to 8 p.m.

Each unit of blood is broken down into red cells, platelets, plasma and cryoprecipitate and each of these components could go to a different recipient.

How much blood may potentially be needed? CBS says a hip replacement requires two units, a car accident four to six units, heart by-pass surgery one to six units and a gunshot wound may require as many as 15 units.

Any healthy person between 17 and 71 years of age with a Blood Donor Card or photo and signature ID is eligible to donate their blood at the Acton clinic.
