Bell's to ring Saturday for Fetal Alcohol Syndrome

At 9:09 a.m. on Saturday, Sept. 9, the Civic Centre bell, along with those at several Acton and Georgetown churches, will be rung to mark FASday – fetal alcohol syndrome day – in recognition of those living with FAS, the leading and only preventable cause of mental retardation in the western world.

Although the Town no longer issues proclamations, it agreed to a request from Acton resident Shiona Watson, the mother of an adopted child with FAS, to ring the Civic Centre bell and mark a minute's reflection at nine minutes past nine o'clock in the morning - the

ninth minute, hour, day and month signifying the nine months of pregnancy during which women shouldn't drink alcohol.

Last year, church and town bells rang in New Zealand, Australia, South Africa, England, Sweden, Germany, the USA and Canada to mark FASday. Numerous Ontario cities have declared Saturday FAS day, including Toronto, Mississauga and Aurora.

This year, 100 Canadian communities are taking part in the day and at general committee on Tuesday, Watson gave Town councillors an overview of FAS and asked for their

support, explaining that alcohol can cause a fetus to be "improperly wired" with permanent brain damage and a host of problems.

"By the time the child gets to school not only is their intellectual potential severely compromised by learning and speech disorders, but also my a system ill-equipped to deal with children who are seen as troubled, badlyparented and disruptive," Watson explained.

Watson said FAS is twice as prevalent as Down syndrome with one in 500 babies born annually in Halton suffering from it and each child costing \$2-million to raise.

"The good news is when children receive early intervention suitable for them before the age of six and the parents receive support and understanding," Watson said, adding these kids are less likely to drop out, become drug addicts or criminals.

Watson said she'd like to start a FAS support group in the Acton area - currently the closest groups are in Guelph and Toronto.

Councillors thanked Watson for the presentation and asked that she make the information available to the local cable system and Halton's medical officer of health.
