

Continued from Page 1 hands-off motivational training technique for problem horses, commonly known as 'horse whispering.'

The Agricultural Society will arrange to supply Barrington with several unruly, problem or never ridden horses and he will "tame" them with his techniques.

"I try to make the performance funny and I use a lot of human concepts and humour and bring the audience right in," Barrington said on Monday.

Organizers of the Homecraft division expect exhibits and entries to be down substantially again this year because there is no building and, like last year, all exhibits will be in a tent on the tennis court.

Homecraft division president Kathryn Brown is looking forward to two new judging categories - homemade wine and millennium marigolds.

"We're hoping to have a good selection of wine entries in four categories, including red and white table wines, a country wine made from anything but grapes and desert wine," Brown said on Monday, adding they have a recognized judge to do the taste testing. Entrants must supply one labeled bottle for display and one unlabeled bottle for decanting.

The new millennium marigold contest in the junior Homecraft division is sponsored by the Acton Horticultural Society and Stokes Seeds. They and Bonnarrow Greenhouse supplied Acton public school children with marigold seeds in the spring and there are cash prizes for the best, the largest, the most colourful and the best arrangement of marigolds.

The Saturday night entertainment this year is a teen dance with a DJ in the tent. Organizers would have liked to re-book the Elvis impersonator who drew huge crowds last year, but he was not available.

Last year's fair broke records for both attendance and profit and organizers are hoping for good weather and better numbers this year. All profit from this year's fair is earmarked for a new building in Prospect Park.

On Saturday, a small army of dedicated volunteers will begin to turn Prospect Park into fair grounds.

THE KIDS ARE BACK IN SCHOOL!

DRIVERS, those big yellow buses are on the road again, drive with extra care, they are likely to stop in unusual places.

The Highway Traffic Act of Ontario states that if a school bus has its red flashing lights activated, traffic

in BOTH DIRECTIONS MUST STOP!!!!!! This law applies everywhere, regardless of the posted speed limit on highway, county roads or in town. A motorist meeting a stopped school bus with the red lights flashing and the stop arm extended must stop unless they are on a highway divided by a median strip. If a motorist begins to overtake a stopped school bus with lights flashing on any highway (going in the same direction for highways divided by a median), they must always stop at least 20 metres before reaching the bus. In all cases motorists may not proceed until the bus resumes motion and the red lights have stopped flashing.

Parents, encourage your children to be extra careful when getting on and off the school bus, check for traffic before crossing the street. Just because the bus is stopped does not mean that all other traffic has, even though they should, and the bus driver only has two eyes, and cannot watch everything, although they try hard.


Failure to obey the above traffic law can result in a fine of not less than \$400.00 and not more than \$2000.00, plus 6 demerit points.


