# Water, water everywhere ... but none to drink

Never in the endless political squabbles has the issue of clean drinking water been more important. The problems in Walkerton have magnified to the point where one official has declared all water that comes from deep wells is suspect, that we can no longer depend on them as a source for drinking.

But in testifying Monday at the official inquiry in to the Walkerton disaster, hydrogeology expert Ken Howard testified that was an "alarmist" attitude. He said groundwater is an excellent source and with a properly designed well, particularly one that goes into a deep aquifer, there's no cause for some of the alarmist views we've heard.

Howard is reported to have said he has a great deal of confidence in the majority of deep water we have in Ontario. "I think it would be a terrible shame if suddenly a lot of the municipalities that presently rely on groundwater were to suddenly put in big pipes into big lakes."

Since about 25 to 30 per cent of Canadians rely on groundwater and that includes 70 per cent of rural dwellers, Howard's statement should bring a huge sigh of relief to municipalities such as Halton Hills. Large urban centres, of course, usually spawn on or near lakes or rivers and rely on treated surface water.

The Walkerton inquiry is equally pertinent for communities like Acton where the reliance on springs and wells is paramount.

Recently, the Region of Halton noted that there was bacteria in untreated water from wells at the corner of Fourth Line and the Town Line with Erin and the Davidson well just south of Acton off Regional Road 25. However, the Region also noted it has been a fact since 1991 and once treated the water is perfectly safe to drink. They are considering some extra equipment at the well to remove the bacteria which it is felt comes from livestock.

Acton has had its problems before with water but mostly from officials' declaration there isn't enough of it. A crock, of course, but a reason to defer development. The Region has repeatedly maintained Acton water is safe to drink. And of good quality. There's no reason to question their integrity.

Halton Council recently approved the final Aquifer Management Plan which has the long term security of the groundwater and surface water resource in the region. The final plan includes a new provision that includes discussions with rural landowners on such things as options for management of manure storage, for keeping livestock away from water courses, and for planning vegetation along banks of rivers and streams to stop erosion.

It's a unique plan, one all water providers would well emulate. After all, good drinking water is not only an asset to a community. It's a necessity.

Canada, it's reported, has the world's second highest per capita consumption of water, estimated at 360 litres per person for household use alone. And yet we use only two per cent of its renewable supply. Surely we can manage our water resources to the point where polluters feel the full wrath of those affected.

## Practical decision

The Acton branch of the Canadian Cancer Society's (CCS) decision to join the Wellington County unit instead of toadying to the Society's wish they join with Oakville, is a clear declaration they are independent and practical under the CCS banner.

When CCS announced it was closing the Georgetown office which served Milton, Acton and Georgetown branches, it caused much consternation and a campaign to save the office. However, the campaign failed. Georgetown branch decided to form its own unit with an office and all the attendant expenses.

The Acton unit, however, decided it wanted to remain under the CCS banner and carry on, as usual, one of the best campaigns in the province per capita. They opted for Wellington where they received a very friendly reception. Since the Wellington office is only a little further away than Georgetown the difference will hardly be noticeable and funds will go to research instead of administration.

is Guiseppe Gori of RR 2, Acton. The other two are from Milton and Georgetown, respectively, Stan Lazarski and Clay Downes.


