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## TOWN DIGEST

### Truck ban

Heavy truck traffic will be banned on the Fourth Line between 17 and 5 Side Roads where gravel trucks are causing "undesirable stress" on the newly resurfaced road. Over 100 residents, concerned with safety, the volume of traffic and its speed, petitioned Council for the ban.

The Town's designated route for trucks from the Acton quarry is either 22 Side Road (Regional Road 43) to Highway 25 or Fourth Line south to 17 Side Road.

Ward two Councillor Kevin Kuiack said he's like to see a designated truck route, based on what the roads. gravel, tar and chip or paved, are capable of carrying.

Noting that residents of the Fourth Line north, of Highway 7, had also petitioned council for a truck ban - and offered to pay for the signs themselves - Acton Councillor Rick Bonnette said there has to be some way to ban trucks from roads that aren't suitable to carry heavy loads.

### Speeding concerns

Concerns over speeding traffic prompted Acton Councillor Clark Somerville to ask staff to investigate the feasibility of installing a three-way stop sign on Mill Street West,

either at Birchway Place, Duby Road or Cobblehill Road.



### Market niche

Despite a "housing explosion" in Milton, Councillor Norm Elliott is convinced there'll be a market for the draft approved long-awaited 805 housing units that will put Acton's population at 10,000.

The major Acton developers have agreed to market Acton as a group and Elliott, who retires next month after 12 years at the council table, much of it spent fighting for Acton growth - said marketing would be "tough," with all of housing choices offered in Milton, but less expensive Acton houses will sell. A housing report indicates the average price of a single-family-home in Halton Hills is \$225,000.

"I think this (Acton) housing supply... will provide a niche for housing that's somewhat below the level of housing prices in Milton and other areas... and will be snapped up by homebuyers," Elliott said.
