Acton Fire Fighters' Association sponsor the annual parade which also marks the official start of the Christmas festive season.





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

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Gastle edges Marilyn for mayor


Police say an unknown number of birds were killed and don't know if the other carcasses were left behind or how many survived.

500 vote margin in tight race Mon.

Halton Hills voters were ready for a change at the top. With a 500-vote margin (6,016 to 5,516) former Norval Councillor Kathy Gastle unseated three-term mayor Marilyn Serjeantson in a close race that generated just 39.2 per cent voter turnout. (All results are unofficial.)

Gastle's former ward mate. Councillor Kevin Kuiack, was also turfed from office and all of the other incumbents who ran had no trouble getting reelected.

Gastle, a nine-year council veteran who took 46 per cent of the popular vote to Serjeantson's 42 per cent, didn't come to the election headquarters at the Civic Centre, but instead, accepted congratulations from

Serjeantson over the phone. At her boisterous victory party in a former Norval church hall, Gastle, who said she felt confident of a win, added it was too soon to say what her first job as mayor would be.

"I'm just so pleased with the support from Acton. Georgetown and Esquesing and their confidence in me that I can lead Halton Hills to new heights of excellence in the next term of office," Gastle said, adding she invited Serjeantson to her party, but she "chose "not to come."

Serjeantson, who said she's very proud of her accomplishments in office, was understandable subdued as she accepted condolences from the small crowd watching the returns.

"I feel really sad that I lost. I loved my job," Serjeantson said adding she regrets spending too much time on Town business when she should have been out cam-

paigning. Serjeantson, who said she planned to take a couple of

trips, laughed that she'd taken out private unemployment insurance offered through a bank last month, and now will see if they'll pay.

Robert Heaton, a former Town councillor, took 11.5 per cent of the popular vote.

Arena costs mean higher taxes?

It will take a higher than expected tax increase, higher user fees and cutting the capital reserve fund to an "unusually low balance," but that's the price Halton Hills Council feels it must pay to twin the Alcott arena in Georgetown.

Urged by five delegations representing thousands of ice users, Council, at a special

meeting last week, awarded the \$1.8 million over-budget project to the same company that built the Acton arena and renovated St. Joseph's School, Melloul-Blamey Construction of Waterloo, the revised low bidder.

The total cost for the ice pad, lobby and minor renovations to the existing arena is \$5.8 million, a number that shocked and surprised most councillors who asked staff

for a list of changes that wouldn't alter the scale, function or operation of the project. Twenty-two reductions were identified resulting in \$300,000 in cuts.

In order to pay for the additional cost Council will take on \$1.2 million in additional debt, changes the ice user fee formula to raise an extra \$50,000 in annual revenues and increase property taxes by 1.2 per cent, or at least \$9

more for the taxpayer with a home valued at \$185,000.

Acton Councillor Clark Somerville questioned the treasurer's "alarm bell" over taking \$300,000 from the capital reserve fund. The reserve was \$2.8 million three years ago and has dropped to the "lowest level it's been at quite a few years" at \$650,000 this year Treasurer Ed DeSousa said, adding there will be
