their assessment - based on current market value as of June 1999. Assessment increases of up to 10 per cent will apply to 17 per cent of homeowners in Halton Hills and, for 16 per cent, their assessment will increase over 20 per cent. The values of commercial properties have increased an average five per cent since 1996 and industrial assessments have increased, on average, 22 per cent.

The assessment is based on a property's estimated selling price, its location and market conditions. The amount of the tax bill is determined using the assessment and the town's residential tax rate, to be set in April or May after upcoming budget debates.

DeSousa said the phones have been very busy at the Town tax office as people began to receive their assessment notice from the Ontario Property Assessment Corporation (OPAC) last week. Town staff referred the calls to the Halton-Peel branch of OPAC, which also reported double the usual 400 calls a day last week from people questioning their assessment notices.

Along with a toll-free number - 905-813-6722 - for inquiries to the Halton-Peel OPAC office, Acton residents are invited to a public information night on December 12, at the Acton arena and community centre from 7:30 to 9 p.m. A general information session will be held covering the new assessment values, but staff won't deal with individual complaints and concerns.



Christmas shopping tips

Continuing with the Christmas shopping theme this week I will talk about personal safety.

PERSONAL SAFETY TIPS

- Ladies, do not carry large amounts of cash in your purse, a wallet in an inside pocket is safer or a fanny pack under your coat works very well to deter purse snatchers. And do not leave your purse unattended in a shopping cart.
- 2. It is a good idea to split up the money you carry into several pockets.
- 3. Men carrying a bulgin wallet in a back pants pocket is an open target for the pick-pocket who will accidently bump into you and steal the wallet. A pocket inside a jacket is more difficult for the pickpocket but is still vulnerable. Here again it is better to keep valuables split up in different pockets.
- 4. Watch around you when taking out your wallet or credit cards. Who is paying undue atention? If someone is watching be extra careful of that person
- 5. Ladies if your purse is grabbed from you, scream as loud as you can, attract as much attention as possible. The thief does not want the attention and may stop what he is doing. But if you feel that you may be injured let the purse go. It can be replaced Remember to split up your valuables such as cash and credit cards and identification so the thief only gets one and not all.

6. If credit cards are stolen, notify the banks right away. Keep a list with emergency numbers separate from the cards. And do not leave your debit card and P.I.N. together.


