Feds studying gasoline, diesel fuel

Call Betty Ann 853-1944 Actonian Norman Foote wrote the federal government concerned over escalating fuel prices and received the following letter from the federal Minister of Industry, Brian Tobin:

Dear Mr. Foote:

The Honourable David Collenette's office has forwarded to me a copy of your letter of October 1, 2000, concerning the rise in fuel prices.

The federal departments of natural Resources Canada and Industry Canada are cosponsoring a comprehensive Conference Board of Canada study on gasoline and diesel markets, in an effort to address concerns regarding the functioning of these markets in Canada. A key objective of the study is to build a better understanding among all parties - the industry, governments and consumers - with respect to how gasoline and diesel markets work.

The Conference Board is examining:

 the relationship between the price of crude oil and the prices of retail and wholesale gasoline and diesel fuel, including input costs, price volatility and the speed of price adjustment; the relationship between prices, supply and demand issues; and,

 the conduct, structure and performance of gasoline and diesel markets in Canada, and a comparison with gasoline markets in the United States.


A unique feature of this study is the public consultation component, begun this October, which uses the preliminary results of the research and analysis as a starting point for discussion. The objectives of the consultations that interested individuals from all stakeholder groups were invited to by the Conference Board, were to create an environment for diverse interests to share their concerns and to start to develop a common understanding of the issues; to develop a regional perspective (the consultations were held in five different cities) on these issues; and to validate

the research and identify

The Conference Board was asked to undertake this comprehensive research and public consultation program because it has the capacity to do independent research at arm's length from both the government and from the petroleum industry. Without this independence, there will continue to be misconceptions and claims of unbalanced analysis that currently plague issues relating to gasoline prices. The Conference Board's web site (http:// www.conferenceboard.ca/) provides details on these consultations and the results of the various research phases will be posted. I invite you to visit the site frequently.

Thank you for providing your views on this important issue.
