"Our officers were unanimous in their support of this initiative which seeks to put the victim first," said Jennifer Knight, the Service's Domestic Violence Coordinator. "Some of the intiatives we have implemented here in Halton are fairly labour intensive, yet what seemed almost overwhelming for investigators six months ago, is now every day practice," added Detective Knight, referring to new reporting procedures for domestic abuse cases.

Halton Police partnered with various community groups and agencies including Halton Women's Place, the Hamilton SPCA, and the Crown Attorney's Office to present overviews of recent cases and inquests, new firearms legislation, specific criminal code legislation relating to stalking, suspect profiling, children witnesses, male victimization, and recent developments in the law relating to spousal abuse.



Shopliffing

Many people are not aware of the serious consequences of a theft and the impact it can have on the victims and their own lives.

If you are arrested or convicted of a theft, prospective employers are going to be less inclined to hire you.

Employers are looking for honest, dependable people. Many jobs now require you to be "Bonded", for insurance purposes, and people with a criminal record will have a difficult time.

If you have a criminal record it can be difficult, if not impossible, to work in a business where a special licence is required - businesses such as real-estate, insurance or the law.

A criminal record could result in you being denied entry into a foreign country. This could ruin your planned family vacation.

Shoplifting, "It's not worth it."

Shoplifting offences are committed by both males and females, the young and old.

Officers find that a lot of the time offenders have sufficient money in their possession, to pay for the stolen items.

When asked why they stole, many offenders don't know why they did it. Some were just trying to get something for nothing, while others did it for "kicks" or to try and "fit in" with a peer group.

I will address my closing remarks to the parents of our local youth. I encourage you to speak with your children about "Shoplifting". Explain that shoplifting is a crime and that there are consequences for those caught shoplifting. Encourage your children to think for themselves, don't follow along with the crowd.

Be aware of who your children's friends are, and what they are doing. When your children go on shopping trips, know how much money your child has to spend and what they expect to buy.

If your child comes home with more merchandise than they had money to buy, ask about it. Don't take easy answers about where it came from. A dated sales slip is a proof of purchase. Outlaw "clothes swapping", unless the parents on both sides know what is being exchanged. Finally, parents set the right example.


