# Internet access just a click away in Acton thanks to CAP

Cyberspace is now just a click away for Acton residents who don't have a computer, but want to learn how to surf the Web and increase their computer know-how.

Robert Little and McKenzie-Smith Bennett Schools are two of 25 Halton schools participating in a Community Access Program (CAP), a partnership with the federal government, local municipalities, libraries, school boards and community groups.

Halton MP Julian Reed, representing Industry Canada, tentatively surfed the Net at Robert Little School on Friday to kickoff a CAP publicity campaign. Reed, whose admits he's still on the onramp to the information superhighway, checked out the four computers at Robert Little School on Friday.

"I think this is perfect for guys like me who can come and be taught and learn how to access a wealth of information that was undreamed of

15 years ago," Reed said as he was shown the school's Web site by Acton High student Stephanie Hynds, who has been hired to provide technical assistance and site maintenance.

Ottawa supplies the hardware and \$425,000 that the Halton District School Board must match with in-kind services including supplying software, system maintenance and a site supervisor.

Reed said the idea of providing Internet access from coast to coast was the dream of former Industry Minister John Manley.

"He had this vision of connecting Canada and now we are the most connected country in the world - we have more Internet access than any other country - and it's a real boost for a country with an infrastructure that's so spread out." Reed said.

When the program ends next April, the computers will belong to the board of edu-

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cation and will stay at the par-

ticipating schools. The computers at Robert Little are available 4 to 8 p.m. Monday to Thursday, and 5 to 9 p.m. on Friday. The hours at MSB are 4 to 8 p.m. Monday, Tuesday and Friday, 4 to 9 p.m. on Wednesday and 4 to 7 p.m. on Thursday.

Although the Community Access Program is designed for adults (over 19) children who are accompanied by an adult may also use the facilities.

Users must sign into the site with identification before they can use the computers.

# Two Halton teachers finalists for awards

Two elementary teachers from the Halton District School Board are finalists in the 2001 Teacher of the Year Awards. Ray Denny of Stewarttown Public School in Georgetown, and Lorna Jones of E.W. A team of judges will choose 10 finalists for Teacher of the Year Awards in June.

The Teacher of the Year Award is an annual award program sponsored in part by the Toronto Sun newspaper. The award recognizes excellence in Ontario's teachers and focuses on positive teaching practices.

Ray Denny is a grade 7/8 Science and Technology teacher whose nomination came from colleagues at his school.

"Ray is the heart of the school, beloved and admired by students, parents and colleagues," says Odette Bartnicki, Principal of Stewarttown. "Ray provides a mentor role to many teachers in our schools, especially to new teachers. As a lifelong learner, he willingly extends his own learning to oth-

According to Rick Kaufman, Principal at E.W. Foster, "Lorna Jones is a most deserving person as Teacher of the Year. As a primary teacher, she brings out the best in her students with her warm and nurturing teaching style. Lorna is an eager learner who uses current teaching practices to improve learning for her students."


The suspect is white, 6'4" with a thin build, 16 to 17 years old with brown hair. He was wearing a blue ball cap.




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
