### Erin firm to relocate in the Acton area

High-speed Internet access was a "huge determining factor" in the decision of TVM (Total Vision Marketing) Building Products to relocate its distribution/marketing company to Acton from Erin.

TVM bought the vacant building on a oneacre property on the southeast corner of Highway 7 and Fourth Line, and will relocate its eight employees, assembly, warehouse and offices to the 10,000-square-foot building when renovations are complete - hopefully by September.

TVM purchased the building in a Power of Sale from the bank. The original owner received a building permit in 1994 and intended to open a bakery, but never received an occupancy per-

TVM president Michael Boulding said he only grudgingly looked at the Acton site, because he was sure it wouldn't have the fibre optic system TVM requires to deal its three U.S. warehouses.

"We were pleasantly surprised to find that Halton Hills Hydro had run the fibre optic line

right outside the door," Boulding said, adding he had been looking to relocate their overcrowded Erin facility to Mississauga when the Acton building came up.

"It's a unique building - there's a 3,500square-foot apartment on the upper level - and we might have a caretaker move in there or expand our offices in the future," Boulding said, adding he hopes to hire four additional staff within the year.

Boulding said they supply materials for the building industry, including reflective foil insulation, silicon and fire-stop sealants and polyurethane foams, but won't be mixing raw materials and chemicals in Acton, just repackaging manufactured goods.

The property is zoned M1 industrial, which allows for a number of uses including light manufacturing, service industrial, dry industry, indoor open storage and a depot for trucks and buses, including repairs and maintenance. Accessory office use is also permitted, along with an apartment.

### Bonnette says it's a provincial issue

Suggestions that Halton should have a uniform bylaw. to restrict and regulate smoking, lit a fire under one Acton politician - a non-smoker who wants the Province, not municipalities, to enact legislation.

Ward 1 and Regional Councillor Rick Bonnette said he might be a "voice in the wilderness," on the smoking issue, but urged Council to let "sleeping dogs lie," when talk of a Region-wide bylaw came up at Town Council last week.

"We are going to get a backlash from some businesses in town. I think we went through the bylaw and, personally, I think the onus is on the Province to make it (smoking legislation) equal. They're the ones making all the money off the provincial sales tax on the sale of cigarettes," Bonnette said, also questioning who would pay to enforce the smoking restrictions.

Included in the Town's more restrictive smoking bylaw, passed by Council last February, is a provision to reconvene a committee to help draft legislation to get to 100 per cent smoke free - public places and workplaces - by July 1, 2003.

Town CAO Steve Andrews said now is a good time to be looking at how to implement a total smoking ban.
