

## Garage sale products must comply


Halton Region Health Department is reminding the public that equipment and toys

Under Canadian law you cannot import, sell, or give away products that do not meet the requirements of the Hazardous Product Act. If you hold a garage sale, you must make sure the products you sell or give away, whether new or used, meet the safety stand-

Baby walkers in particular pose a safety hazard and should not be purchased. Baby walkers raise infants closer to harmful objects such as hot iron and electric kettles, and increase their chance of having a fall.

Injuries due to baby walkers are most common in children under one year of age, and result most often in head injuries. Walkers were taken off the Canadian market due to

infant injuries.


Safety Tips: ·Do not buy a baby walker •Be careful when buying items

for babies and young children ·Ask for the manufacturer's manual or brochure

·Inspect baby items to see if all the parts are in good working order, that there is no sign of damage, and that there are no white marks or stress marks on the plastic.

·Toys must be in good condition with no broken parts, and look for small pieces that can cause a baby to choke




