## 'Mysterious' malady at camp still mysterious

The mysterious malady that sent 11 children, a staff leader and two volunteers from the Town's musical theatre camp at Acton High School to hospitals last week has still not been identified.

Joy Thompson, the Town's manager of recreation service told The New Tanner that tests by the fire department, public health, Halton Region and the Board of Education, all came up "clean." They tested everything, Ms. Thompson said, including the curtains, and

any possible connection to an illness and could find no cause for the illness. All tests came up negative and they were "complete and thorough," including blood tests.

The children have moved back to the high school now but they are using the cafeteria instead of the room behind the stage. The illness, which struck on Monday, July 16 when one child complained of feeling sick in the morning. It wasn't a widespread problem until about 2:30 in the afternoon when several more

children became ill and fainted.

Staff called 911 and evacuated the 40 children taking part in the musical theatre camp, as well as volleyball and soccer camps. One soccer camp participant also became ill.

We're working with the children to help them overcome feelings they might have over the incident last week, Joy Thompson said. We're also keeping parents informed about the reports they have been receiving from the various agencies.

"Parents are supportive and want to know what happened," Ms Thompson said. We're in a better air-conditioned facility now and the complete musical production is going to happen this Thursday.

The children affected are from Acton, Georgetown, Rockwood, Erin and Hillsburgh. They ranged in age from eight to 11. Four of the victims were taken to Georgetown hospital and ten to Milton hospital. They were treated



#### Pride in community reflected in gardens

Judges from the Communities in Bloom competition will be visiting Halton Hills on Tuesday, August 14, and coming down 16 Acton streets as they determine winners in the contest.

This is a town-wide project to showcase the beautiful municipal, corporate and residential gardens and green spaces in Halton Hills. Judges will follow a specific route through Halton Hills and include these Acton streets: Mill E., Acton Blvd., Frederick, Bower, Alice, Willow, main N., Guelph, Lakeview Ave., Elmore Dr., Elizabeth Dr., Knox, Park Ave., Mill W., Birchway Pl. and the Dublin Line.

The judge's tour starts at the civic centre in Georgetown and travels the length and breadth of Halton Hills, stopping at some selected places. When they are through Acton they travel down the Dublin Line and

### MPP Ted Chudleigh busy this summer

He's set an ambitious schedule consulting with representatives of chemical and construction businesses and studying access to risk capital.

Mr. Chudleigh has been to southwestern Ontario for meetings with companies in Sarnia's chemical valley. He is slated for extensive consultations with companies located west and north of Toronto as well as in Northern Ontario.

"I'm trying to understand what government can do to help these key sectors

of our economy," said Chudleigh. "If we can get ahead of the curve, and make necessary changes now, we can help these companies smooth out the economic cycle. That leads to more growth, more jobs and opportunity, and ultimately better living standards."

"It is my goal to identify, red tape, in-


ter-provincial trade barriers, regulatory issues and other impediments to growth. At the end of the consultation process I will make recommendations to the Minister," said the Halton MPP.
