## Province purchases land in town

The Ontario government has selected three parcels of land in Halton for purchase and protection, Halton MPP Ted Chudleigh announced recently.

Ontario purchased 11 properties totaling 242.5 hectares, across the province in the past year. Three of those purchases are in Halton. The ecologically significant Terra Cotta Forest, a 39 hectare parcel will be added to the Terra Cotta Conservation Area in Halton. The area has already been designated an Area of Natural and Scientific Interest.

Purchases in Halton accounted for \$906,280 and include a 40-hectare addition to the Bruce Trail through the Town of Halton Hills. This parcel contains a provincially significant wetland known as the Halton Escarpment Wetland Complex. The third purchase in Halton this year secures an 800-metre section of the Bruce Trail.

Since the inception of this program almost \$10 million has been spent to acquire more than 1,186 hectares of ecologically significant lands. The program is a key component of Ontario's Living Legacy, which was launched in 1999 with the announcement by Premier Harris of 378 new provincial parks and protected areas.

Prior to 2001, four other Halton area properties were secured under this program. Two of the properties are in Milton and two in Halton Hills. The total cost of the

four purchases was \$122,090 and they secured 1.5 kilometres of the Bruce trail.

The land purchases have been completed under Ontario's Living Legacy program, which is an ongoing commitment to buy property to protect and preserve significant natural areas. Funding for the acquisitions comes from the Ministry of Natural Resources' Natural Areas Protection Program.

"Buying these properties places them under protection so they can be enjoyed by our children and generations of Ontarians to come," Halton MPP Ted Chudleigh said.

Two steps lead up to the family room, with its gas fireplace and a wet bar. A den and a powder room complete the main floor.

Upstairs, the master suite has been designed as the ultimate retreat, with all the features anyone could want in the bedroom area.

The bedroom itself has a 10-foot ceiling and is given its own private balcony. A carousel sitting room shares a two-sided fireplace with the en suite bathroom and a large walk-in closet completes this luxurious suite.

The two large bedrooms share a skylit bathroom.

An unfinished gamesroom at the front of the house can be used as a recreation room, hobby space or entertainment room.

Multi-split levels are popular floor plan options because they offer excellent separation between recreation, living and sleeping areas.

The house is 40 feet, 8 inches wide and 53 feet deep with 2,213 sq. ft. of living space and an unfinished basement.

## Split-level design

An efficient floor plan makes optimum use of space to give the house three bedrooms, a den, family room, outsized master suite and an unfinished games room.

The living room and dining room will make an impression immediately on entering the foyer. The large, rectangular living room has a lofty 10-foot ceiling and the sunken dining room is separated by an attractive railing.

The great room stretches across the width of the house at the rear and is sure to be well-used as the hub of the family's informal living activities.
