## Burned-out Royal Café's future is uncertain

It's too soon to know if the Royal Café will re-open after a recent fire in an apartment above the Mill Street restaurant.

While damage to the restaurant is minimal,

fire officials peg damage to the apartment at \$75,000 and co-owner John Wong is impatiently waiting for information from his insurer before deciding what to do.

On Sunday, Wong said it would take a "couple of weeks" to remove debris from the gutted apartment, home to brothers John and

Kong Wong and their wives. It would also take a few more weeks to clean the restaurant that suffered some smoke and water damage.


There were no injuries in the September 15 fire that started on the stove in the apartment and quickly burned out of control.

John Wong is unsure if they will re-open the Mill Street business that he's owned for 50 years. He said their plan "depends on the insurance," and doesn't expect any information for a couple of weeks.

The Wongs are staying with family in Acton.









#### Two badly hurt in head-on crash

A 38-year-old Acton man has been charged with drunk driving following a head-on crash on Sunday that left two people badly injured.

Wellington County OPP report a 1997 Ford pickup truck, travelling westbound on Highway 7, crossed the centre line near the Eramosa/ Milton Town Line at 7:35 p.m. on Sunday, striking an eastbound 2001 Ford Ranger pickup truck.

The driver of the Ranger, 25-year-old Giphton Gunn of Acton, was taken to Guelph Hospital and then transferred to the Hamilton Trauma Centre where, at presstime, he was listed in serious condition with numerous fractures.

His passenger, 22-year-old Kathleen Dubois of Guelph, was airlifted to Sunnybrook Trauma Centre where she's listed in critical condition with serious head injuries, a fractured pelvis and internal injuries.

### Search for physicians continues

The how, why and what's next in the search for family physicians for Acton and Georgetown were laid out for Town councillors on Monday in an update from officials with the Georgetown campus of the William Osler Health Centre.

Local politicians were told their financial assistance, help with short-term housing for fill-in, physicians and planning

policies to encourage development of new medical offices may be needed to help recruit family physicians. While a Halton physician recruitment committee recently identified Acton as the area of Halton with the most "acute" need for family physicians – at least two more are needed - Halton Hills, which has been designated as an Underserviced Area by the province, needs at least another 11 family physicians who are willing to take on hospital duties along with a practice.

Currently there are 20 family physicians in Halton Hills.

Dr. Jeff Sutherland, the site chief of family practice at the Georgetown campus, said the current family physician shortage was fuelled by a number of issues, including a report done 10 years ago that indicated there would be an over supply of physicians across Canada by the year 2000.
