Bantam Tanners elude St. Thomas 'A' championship

Following a fast regular - season start, and with memories of their 2000 tournament victory in the AE division, Acton's Major Bantam Tanners headed down the highway to St. Thomas this Thanksgiving Weekend fully intent on bringing home the 'A' division hardware. Although missing sparkplug forward Jason Beatty and veteran hard-shooting defenceman Mike Kuiper (with a serious foot injury), it was still a strong side, including newcomers Troy Ethier and Matt Freckleton, that roled over early opponents Hamilton and Meadowvale by an aggregate 16-1 score.

Sunday morning, with a slot in the evening final at stake, Acton jumped out 2-0 early against LaSalle. However, the team's longtime nemesis, unnecessary penalties, which would ultimately deprive them of the championship, struck. A man up, LaSalle made it 2-1 last in the first; then, up two men and :20 on the clock, came the game's turning point. With Jordan Guindon down, the LaSalle forward missing a gaping top corner as the period closed.

LaSalle, quick-skating and sharp passing, carried their momentum into the second, an exciting period featuring numerous narrow escapes as Guindon was steady and the overworked Acton defence made numerous last-ditch recoveries on the flying LaSalle

forwards. With nothing to show for their efforts, LaSalle's third period slump enabled the Tanners to pull away to a 5-1 final, Matt Bronoziewski's shorthanded steal, and score early in the third, applying the killing blow.

London-Mt. Brydges proved a formidable final opponent, their forechecking pressure gave them a quick 2-0 lead putting Acton behind for the first time in the tourney. Rattled and under intense pressure by the strong forechecking and quick transitions of Mt. Brydges, Acton eventually settled down, cleaned up their end and for the game's latter half carried the play with an evident advantage in stamina. Sustained, smart play finally reeled in Mt. Brydges to 2-1 late in the third, with every indication of more to come. But this prosperity was not to last; faster than Don Cherry could say, "You kids out there...", the Tanners found themselves two men short for two minutes, with only four remaining in the game, during which desperate span they gave up the 3-1 goal and incurred yet another penalty.

But as head coach Bill Manes, though visibly upset by the penalties, observed after the game, there was no quitting in these boys. Mark Boycott's brilliant shorthanded goal again gave the Tanners life with 1:27 remaining. Their Sisyphean task was finally ended by the clock.
