

Over Tones win international award

At Harmony Inc.'s international chorus contest in London, Ontario recently, the Guelph Over Tones won the LABBS trophy. This award is presented by the Ladies' Association of British Barbershoppers to the nonmedallist chorus with the highest presentation score.

The Over Tones placed 8th in a field of 25 choruses from all over Canada and the U.S.A. The Over Tones have several members from this area.

In order to compete internationally, each chorus must score a minimum number of points in an area contest earlier in the year. In the past two

years, The Over Tones have moved from position 15 to position 8.

Chorus members credit director B.J. Vermue with this rapid improvement. B.J. has been with the chorus for five years. During that time the chorus has grown from 17 to 40 members.

The 2001 Championship Chorus is the Village Vocal Chords (VVC) from Chicago. This outstanding chorus has been defeated only once... in 1978, by The Over Tones.


The 2002 international contest will be staged in Indianapolis, Indiana. The Over Tones are already work-





OPP nail two speeding drivers

Drivers are still continuing to drive at excessive rates of speed despite aggressive enforcement, say Wellington OPP in a release this week.

The OPP's Traffic Management Unit nabbed two drivers who were travelling at high rates of speed on Watson Road on Friday, November 30. The first vehicle, a 2001 Dodge Ram, recorded 117 km/h on radar in a posted 50 km/h zone. A 27year-old Guelph man was charged by Constable Dave Brazier.

On the same day, and at the same location, a 29-year-old Acton man was charged with going at 104 km/h in the 50 km/h zone in a 1990 Dodge. He's scheduled to appear in Guelph court on January 10.




