Being stranded on the highway is a frightening and potentially dangerous situation for motorists, especially in the winter, police point out. With cold temperatures and reduced visibility, it is not safe to be stranded for a long period of time. This sign offers a proven solution that enables stranded motorists to receive the help they need as quickly as possible.

The Highway Help Sign replaces the previous Call Police signs that get propped inside the vehicle, and are difficult to see at night and in inclement weather. Crime down in rural areas, HHRPC credits police service

November statistics which show crime is down in rural Halton Hills while other surrounding communities have seen increases has prompted the town Rural Community Policing Committee (HHRPC) to publicly thank Halton Police.

Statistics show break and enters are down 25% for shops and 7% for homes while auto thefts are down 11%. Over 800 tickets have been written since Project Gateway was initiated in the spring.


Personal injuries are down 56% and property damage down 28% indicating much better road safety, a committee spokesman said.

The rural team members include Inspector Bill Ford, former Staff Sgt. Don Cousens, Sgt. Grey Baun and four rural community officers. They meet regularly with HHRPC to identify rural problems and find solutions. They made recommendations for increasing the resources available to the rural areas including one which kept the Georgetown station open and expanded it to include a crime unit

Two additional radar cars, a "ghost" car and "Stealth" car will soon be available for traffic enforcement along the 202 kms of rural roads in Halton Hills as well as a new motorcycle.

The HHRPC and police also jointly promote the Road Watch program which encourages residents to report aggressive driving so warning letters can be sent out by a constable and civilian coordinator working together. Rural officers also report all break-ins to an HHRPC coordinator who warns residents through Rural Alert, a phone network linking 11 Rural Watches.

Councillor Bryan Lewis, who sits on the HHRPC notes that rural residents who would like to participate in the program can attend the next meeting on January 22 at the Georgetown police station.
