Acton mural project completed with commissioning of plaques

The final phase of the Acton Heritage Mural project was recently completed, with the commissioning of two plaques featuring the history of each mural. The plaques, made by Enameltec Porcelain Signage, Georgetown, depict the original heritage photographs used by artist Michelle Loughery to interpret the theme for each mural, as outlined by the Acton Heritage Mural Committee.

The plaque for the indoor mural has been erected in the Acton Arena and Community

Centre and the plaque for the mural at Mill and Main will be attached to the outdoor mural wall.

This project, which commenced in 1999, was developed by Acton Heritage Murals committee members Joy Thompson, Town Manager of Recreation Services; Norm Elliott, Councillor Town of Halton Hills; Don Payne, Chairperson Heritage Halton Hills and Janis Fread, Coordinator Acton BIA. The committee, which met monthly to plan the project,

received guidance from Mural Routes to format a comprehensive call for entry package, which was circulated to artists across Canada.


When entries were received, the committee gathered an independent panel of five individuals experienced in the arts and history of the Acton community, to serve as judges for the competition.

The committee presented the selected artist with both a written and pictorial history of Acton, using heritage photographs and documents borrowed from Acton citizens. This enabled the artist to develop an accurate and detailed plan for each mural.


The committee applied for and received funding from The Millennium Bureau for Canada and as well solicited funds from generous community businesses and individuals. The monies raised completely funded the project, which includes the plaques,

the joint venture brochure with the Acton BIA, the illuminating spotlights for both murals and a trust fund for future maintenance of the murals.





Georgetown resident wins CN award

Canadian National has honoured Georgetown resident Richard Boyer through its President's Awards for Excellence program for 2001. Boyer, who lives in Georgetown, works at the transportation company as terminal manager Intermodal at Brampton.
