Upgrade Georgetown purification plant

Halton Region has hired Wellington Construction through a public tendering process, to begin implementing upgrades to the Georgetown Water Purification Plant on Maple Avenue. It was the lowest tender for the \$2.6 million project.

The upgrades will introduce a filtration process, using catalytic media filters to remove manganese, followed by chlorination. The result will be an end to the discolouration problems that Georgetown residents have been experiencing due to the high levels of manganese in the local water source.

Manganese, a harmless and naturally occurring substance in Georgetown's water, does not have any adverse impact on human health, but its aesthetic appearance has been a concern for residents. The new filtration system will remove the manganese from the raw water, eliminating the need for the home filtration kits that the Region has been supplying to households in Georgetown.

Work on the project will begin soon, and is expected to be complete in early September 2002. The upgrades at the Maple Avenue plant will also provide the capacity to introduce additional features in the future, such as an ultraviolet process to provide a dual disinfection barrier.

Residents may continue to pick up home filtration kits from Halton Region until the work is complete.

Children's Wish Foundation benefits

The Halton Regional Police Service is the link in handing over a \$1,000 cheque issued by the Ontario Water and Sewer Main Association to the Children's Wish Foundation.

Since the summer of 2001, Halton Regional Police Service officers were involved in investigations relating to the theft of large pieces of construction equipment from worksites throughout Halton. In September, 2001, two men were arrested for their roles in the thefts. Subsequently over \$700,000 worth of equipment was located and seized from the Caledon and York region.

In appreciation of the efforts of the police officers, the member companies of the Ontario Water and Sewer Main Association have donated a \$1,000 cheque to the Children's Wish Foundation on behalf of the Halton Regional Police Service, and the police investigation.

Police launch Outreach program for Halton boys under 12

Halton Regional Police Service, in partnership with Children's Assessment Treatment Centre (CATC), Community Resource Services (CRS), both the School Boards, Children's Aid society (CAS), Halton Adolescent Support Services (HASS), and regional Fire Services, launch the Under 12 Outreach Project today (Jan. 10). It is aimed at boys under 12 years of age that come into conflict with the law.

Currently the federal Young Offenders Act deals with children and youth aged

12 through 17 years, with no formalized program or services for the younger children who commit crime. As a result, in partnership with the major stakeholders in the community, the development of a protocol including the police, will refer children on a voluntary basis to the Under 12 Project. The Project aims to get the boys together in group settings, to learn to communicate and deal with issues in a positive manner. As well, parent groups will meet for advice and support.

Okuloski, Regional Police Service program coordinator, says, "This is a fantastic program to help turn kids around before they end up in the formal court processes. The partnership between all the community stakeholders ensures that each family re-

ferred to the program will receive the proper direction and support to avert any further intervention."

Participants in the program will have a range of services available to them based on their individual needs.

Obesity subject for free health seminar

Healthcare professionals now recognize that obesity is a chronic disease that can lead to diabetes, heart disease, high blood pressure, high cholesterol levels and certain types of cancers. Being overweight can also cause problems such as sleep apnea (interruptions of deep sleep) and osteoarthritis (wearing away of the joints).

Even a small weight loss of 10 to 20 pounds can improve a person's health by lowering blood pressure and/or cholesterol levels. Interventions to help weight loss, such as eating sensibly and increasing physical activity, can be very effective. A long-term commitment is needed to avoid regaining the weight and the risks associated with yo-yo dieting.
