Continued from Page 8. per capita basis, DeSousa said Halton Hills ranks seventh on the list with an average combined Town and Regional per person tax bill of

"We're not levying much on our citizens," he said, but added the other side of the coin shows 86.6 per cent of what they do collect comes from residential taxpayers who "unfortunately" pay most of the tax increases, underscoring the need to attract more commerce and industry to town.

An urban residential property owner with a current market assessment of \$200,000, paid \$2,643 in taxes last year including \$746

for education, \$692 for Town purposes, \$802 for Regional services, \$275 for police and \$130 for waste pickup.

Some of the highlights of the 2003-2011 capital forecast for Acton include:

\$1.1-million in 2003 to reconstruct Churchill Road South

\$210,000 in 2004 to reconstruct Victoria Street

\$200,000 in 2007 to resurface Main Street from Church to Kingham

\$300,000 in 2003, 2005 and 2008 for a sports park in Acton East

\$120,000 in 2004 for a skateboard park

\$160,000 in 2003 for development of the Wallace Street Park

New waste collection schedules start Feb. 4

Halton's new streamlined waste and recycling collection schedules will come into effect the week of February 4.

The change to Halton's waste collection routes is necessary to better accommodate the needs of the growing region, a release from the Region explains. Currently, the collection routes are fragmented; meaning that collection is taking place in several locations across the region throughout the week. The new streamlined collection routes will concentrate more resources in individual areas on collection day, allowing for increased supervision, better support for waste collection operators, and faster action when unforeseen circumstances arise.

The new routes mean a change for waste collection operators as well as residents. "We expect it will take some time to get used to - both for residents and for our new contractor - but we have extra resources on hand for the first few weeks of the new schedule to help ensure the changeover runs as smoothly as possible," said Rob Rivers, Halton Region's Director of Waste Management Services.

Collection days for apartments and commercial properties are not changing.


