
Recover stolen truck in corn field

Police said the blowing snow obscured the highway centre line when the accident occurred just after 6 a.m. and no charges will be laid.

A 1996 Oldsmöbile driven by 53-year-old Donald Koster of Rockwood was severely damaged. The 1989 International driven by a 45-year-old Etobicoke resident received moderate damage.

A burnt out furnace motor filled a John Street South residence with smoke at 2:02 last Wednesday morning. There was no fire and Acton firefighters ventilated the smoke from the home.



Tips for Buying a Used Vehicle

Don't let this scenario happen to you.

Q. Just last week I saw an ad in the paper (or a "For Sale" sign stuck on the windshield). I called the guy and he met me at my place. I took a test drive and decided to buy the car. It was a good deal he only wanted \$12,000. He said he needed the cash right away, because there was another buyer interested in the car. I gave him the cash. Next thing I know the police are at my door and my new car is being towed away. Why?

A. You bought a stolen car. Your \$12,000 is gone and you probably won't get it back.

To protect yourself against con-men and fly-bynight car salesmen, get the facts.

Before you buy a vehicle from a private seller, ask to see the Used Vehicle Information Package (sellers are required by law to provide it) to verify:

- 1) Approximate retail value.
- 2) Registrant history (to determine if the vehicle is registered in the name of the seller and to see how much experience the seller has with the vehicle)
- 3) That the date of first registration is close to the year of vehicle manufacture (vehicle may have a previous history in another jurisdiction)
- If there are liens registered against the vehi-

Avoid any seller who:

- 1) Pressures you to make a hurried decision.
- Discourages you from checking facts.
- 3) Avoids having you view the vehicle at their home or if they are a dealer, has no office lot and
- 4) Suggests that you can avoid paying taxes. He/ She wants to ensure that you won't go to the authorities if there's a problem.
