Communities in Bloom meet attracts crowd to civic centre

The council chambers at the Town of Halton Hills civic centre were filled last Monday night with members of the community anxious to support the committee spearheading the town's participation in the 2002 Communities in Bloom national competition.

Warren Harris, Manager of Parks & Cemeteries, presented an overview of the preparation, plantings, cooperation and planning that went into the project last year, which saw the Town of Halton Hills win at the provincial level when competing with municipalities of similar size. Harris stressed how impressed the two judges were with the community wide volunteer base that worked on the project in co-operation with local businesses and town staff. And judging by the interest shown at Monday night's meeting, planning for the 2002 competition will proceed with just as much enthusiasm!

Many ideas were presented at the informal discussion part of the meeting, covering everything from shared plantings from residential gardens to developing a contest to promote a litter-free environment. The Adopt-a-Garden program, run by the town, is an excellent way for groups to take ownership of



a public space with garden design and plantings.

Both the Acton and Georgetown Horticultural Societies hold spring plant sales – Georgetown is May 4 and Acton holds their very popular sale at the olde Hide House parking lot on May 11. Combined with the Acton Horticultural plant sale is the Black Gold compost sale by the Acton Agricultural Society. Both these venues not only support the groups involved, but also allow homeowners to purchase seasoned plants and compost to round

out their spring planting. The gardening advice is free!

The Town of Halton Hills Communities in Bloom committee, chaired by Mayor Kathy Gastle, has been divided into four sub-committees: Marketing, Residential, Public Space and Industrial/ Commercial/Institutional. He was released to his parents with a February 28 court date. The other three students were not charged and were released to their parents.


Homeowners beware


