

Conservation Halton wants nominations for good deeds

Conservation Halton wants to hear about any good deeds or actions that enhanced the natural environment during 2001.

Since 1982, Conservation Halton has been recognizing people and organizations who have made significant contributions to conservation in the Halton watershed. Nominees have included such groups as teacher associations and federations, scout and guide organizations, naturalist clubs, corporations, government agencies and private landowners.

There are four categories in the program: individual, institutional, educational and the conservation honour roll.

The winners' names are placed on a plaque, displayed in the lobby of Conservation Halton's office and individual plaques are presented to the recipients.

Last year more than 30 people and groups were recognized from all areas of the watershed including Halton Hills, Oakville, Burlington, Milton, Flamborough,

Mississauga, Dundas and Puslinch. Conservation actions have included activities such as tree planting, stream rehabilitation and clean-up, school yard naturalization projects, environmental education activities, wildlife improvement projects, and fundraising for conservation.


Residents of the watershed have inherited a rich natural legacy encompassing such features as the Niagara Escarpment, abundant wetlands,

streams and many environmentally sensitive areas. One of the reasons these areas have been preserved and maintained is the fact that many groups and individuals are doing good conservation deeds.

New waste schedule working well

Halton residents are on top of their new waste collection schedule, reports Halton Waste Management staff.

"We have had about 80 to 90 per cent compliance on collection days across the Region," said Rob Rivers, Halton Region's Director of Waste Management. "The residents have been very supportive – it is thanks to them that the change to the new schedule has worked so well."

Starting February 4, Halton has been rolling out a streamlined waste collection schedule to better manage the needs of the growing region, and to ensure better service by providing more backup and supervisory support.

The volume of calls to customer service representatives at Access Halton is higher than normal, largely due to the introduction of the new schedule. "Most of the residents we're hearing from are seeking clarification on their collection zone," said Ron MacMaster, Manager of Access Halton. "We have been able to answer calls quickly and make sure people get the information they need."




