More housing details requested

Town councillors want clear maps, more restrictive control on future residential growth and absolute numbers before adopting staff's 2002 municipal housing statement update.

General committee deferred adopting the update when it was presented to them on Monday, asking staff to come back to Council this Monday to continue the debate on the update, a tool to help the Town plan for a full range of housing.

Georgetown Councillor Moya Johnson had a number of concerns with the report, including the lack of clear maps and use of the terms "in-filling" and "intensification" when talking about vacant residential land with development potential.

Pointing to two large maps in the Council Chambers, marked with orange dots showing vacant residential land, Johnson said, "it bothers me that there are little pockets on single-family ' home streets that are orange, and I realize they are vacant lots, but it implies you could put an apartment there, or townhouses right in the middle of a neighbourhood that is already single family," Johnson said.

Planner Steve Burke noted that it's the Town's Official Plan that indicates what type of housing will be built where, leading Councillor Johnson to ask that the term "intensification" be removed from the housing statement, leaving the term "in-filling" to deal with the areas marked for potential development.

Georgetown Councillor Ron Chatten questioned how staff concluded the Town had met its housing mix guidelines when it had done nothing to provide affordable rental housing in the past 10 years.

"That's why we have so many people living in illegal apartments, probably in very unsafe conditions, paying

probably three times what

they should be paying,"

Chatten said, adding they

have to encourage high density development to occur. Acton and Regional Councillor Rick Bonnette questioned why staff would be looking at in-filling and intensification when Halton Hills is "almost at the saturation point" as far as provid-

ing water. "When is enough, enough? When do you finally say this is it?" Bonnette asked, adding the continual search for water will lead to the "great debate" over bringing Lake Ontario water to Halton Hills.

Burke said Halton Hills will have a population of 69,500 in 2021, 500 people short of Halton's population allocation within the existing urban boundaries.

Bonnette also questioned if the former Beardmore site in Acton had been considered for in-filling or intensification.

Planning director Bruce MacLean said staff are "constantly looking at the Beardmore property because it is part of the fabric of the community of Acton."

He said they've set the site, which has servicing constraints and land use opportunities, aside while they look for opportunities as they come along, including discussions about possible industrial use, residential use, and green-space under public ownership.

The housing update shows that Halton Hills:

Ø Has a "virtual lack" of high-density, affordable apartments

Ø Has the youngest and fastest growing population in Halton with a "significant" population of seniors

Ø Has the lowest poverty rate in Halton

Ø The size of the average household has decreased while the number of singleparent households increased by 30 per cent over the 1991-96 period.

The entire evening's presentations are free of charge, and light refreshments will be available. Please plan on attending.

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
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
