

New councillor sworn in

Guelph/Eramosa council is back up to full strength with the swearing in Monday of Sandy McPhedran as the new councillor for Ward 4. The township's lawyer, Robin Lee Norris administered the oath. Municipal nursery planned

Guelph/Eramosa's recreational director Glen Smith wants a bit more time to fine tune details for a proposed municipal nursery plot to provide trees for local roadsides and parks. In a report to council Smith said volunteers have

approached him about establishing a 10 foot by 50 foot plot to raise seedlings either at Marden or behind the municipal office at Brucedale. While council supports the idea, Smith said he needs to talk more with the volunteers interested in the project before asking council to dedicate a site for the tree nursery.

Highway repairs

Repairs to a section of Highway 7 south of Rockwood, undermined by a leaking water line earlier this spring will cost Guelph/ Eramosa more than \$15,000. Public Works manager Larry Van Wyck told council the province's bill for materials for the job was reasonable. However, he was concerned both with the number of hours and the hourly rate paid to the private contractor hired by the ministry to repair the road. He raised the issue with the

ministry without success. Since the municipality will need to deal with the ministry on another matter later this year, he advised council to just pay up and hope that will make the ministry more reasonable over the future matter.

Van Wyck wants to use open graded cold mix asphalt. This flexible pavement can be placed atop the existing road with conventional paving equipment, he said, and moves during the freeze-thaw cycles while healing in warmer weather. in more remote areas where hot mix asphalt is not readily avail-

able, he said. Having received council's approval in principle, he wanted time to check prices

the budgeted money. Award contract Guelph/Eramosa awarded the contract for street cleaning equipment to Cox Construction and the contract for calcium chloride to Miller Paving. Cox will charge the municipality \$41.73 per hour for its 2000 gallon water tank and \$65.27 per hour for both a six cubic yard truck and an eight cubic yard truck. The calcium will cost the municipality \$293.86 per tonne, plus GST


Rockwood. She estimated the project will take more than 400 hours to do and total cost to produce 500 books will be more than \$13,000. Coun. Doug Breen said while the project has merit for Rockwood, he couldn't support using general tax funds for it. He suggested taking any grant from the Rockwood Hydro Reserve fund.

Coun. Sandy McPhedran said he felt it would be of general interest and could see no reason she shouldn't pay herself for her time on the project.

Coun. David McCrae said the issue was whether the book was supposed to make a profit or just recoup its costs. If it was to be a money maker, then public funds shouldn't be involved.

"You'd think if someone wanted a grant, she'd be here in person to answer questions and explain the project to us," he said.
