

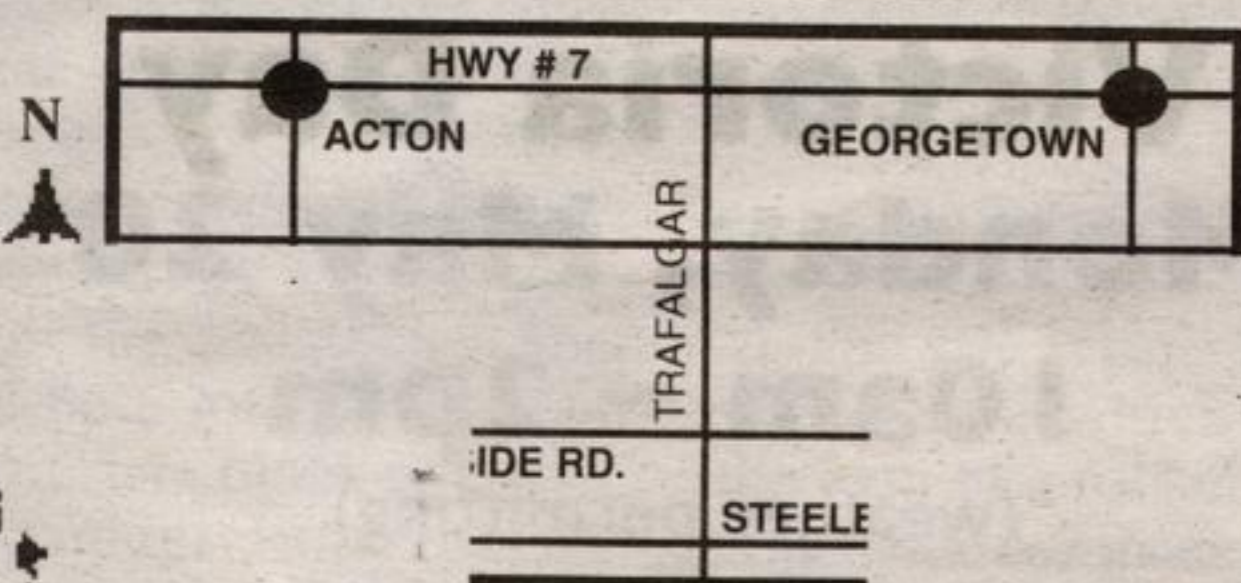

### Dealing With Stains

unsightly deposits that can result from the leak. Use a bleach-and-water solution to remove mildew. Rinse the surface thoroughly. Note: To avoid creating high moisture conditions beneath the surface, avoid "flooding" the area with water, bleach or cleaning solutions.

\* Dry the surface thoroughly. Use a hair dryer to dry small areas. Larger areas may require the use of a dehumidifier, heater or fan to ensure the surface is completely dry before priming.

\* Prime the surface with a shellac-base primer-sealer.

\* In high humidity areas, like bathrooms, repaint with a product that prevents future mildew growth on the paint film.

## Hair razing event raises over \$2,500 for cancer fight

Three Acton residents spent a whole lot less time fussing over their hair on Tuesday morning – because it had all been shaved off on Monday for a good cause.

To raise money for the Acton branch of the Canadian Cancer Society, Acton Councillor Clark Somerville offered (again) to shave his head if he didn't raise the most pledges.

His offer was quickly challenged by Acton Motors owner Norm Paulsen, and then Acton's Heather Vanderweide.

Paulsen, who actually won the challenge by raising \$1,348 to Somerville's \$860 and Vanderweide's \$309, was a good sport and agreed to have his head shaved anyway, as did Vanderweide and Somerville.

So, on Monday, Profile Beauty salon owner Monica Galway, shaved all three of them during the annual Paul Murr golf tournament, another popular and lucrative fundraiser for the Cancer Society.

"I'd do it again – it was lots of fun," Paulsen said on Tuesday as he sported a stubble of dark hair.

"Most people gave willingly and I needed a hair cut anyway," he joked, adding his kids were "surprised" by his new look and his wife was "pleasantly surprised."

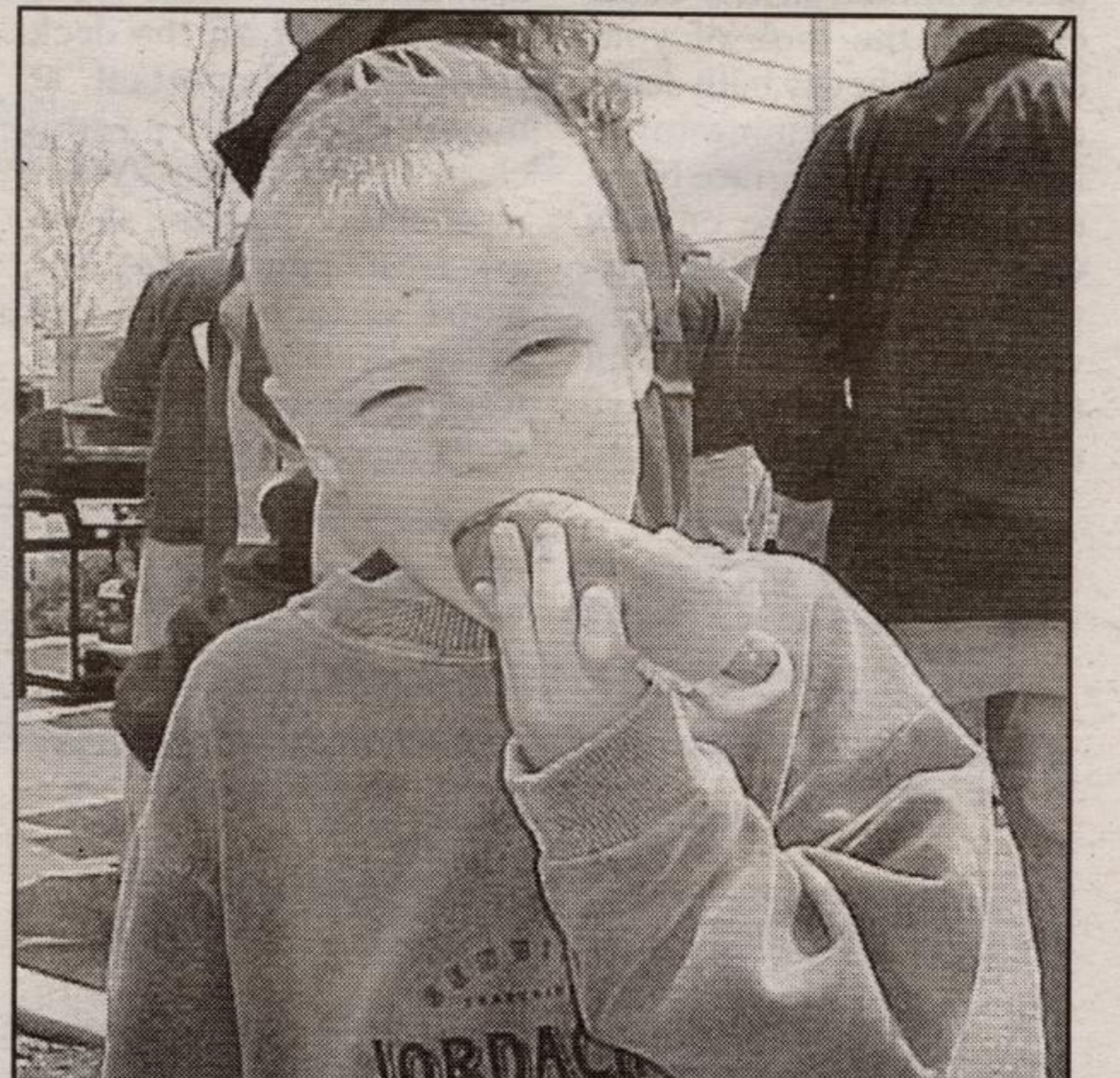
Vanderweide, who was

worried (luckily unnecessarily) that she might have a strange shaped head, said she "never would have been able to donate" the amount of pledges that she collected, mainly from the congregation of her Limehouse church, and is "grateful for all the support she received and is happy she was able to help a good cause."

Councillor Somerville

said there are no "losers" because they raised a lot of money – \$2,517 in total and still counting – raised a lot of awareness and had fun.

"People who saw me today (Tuesday) and hadn't heard about the challenge made donations, so I hope we can raise even more money," Somerville said, thanking donators for being so generous.
