## Reference guide for emergency situations

As part of Emergency Preparedness Week, the Towns of Halton Hills, Milton and Oakville and the City of Burlington, in partnership with the Region of Halton and the Halton Police Service, have released a comprehensive reference guide that encourages and assists residents in planning for various types of emergency situations.

The Personal Emergency Preparedness Guide addresses a number of emergency situations whether man-made, acts of nature or bio-hazardous, and outlines the appropriate steps to take in preparation for, during and following an emergency. Residents are urged to retain the guide and fill in the designated sections with per-

sonal contact information. It also contains emergency and non-emergency telephone numbers pertinent to residents of Halton.

The Personal Emergency Preparedness Guide will be available as of May 8 as follows:

- at all Halton Region and Local Municipal offices and facilities, such as libraries, recreation centres, fire departments, etc.

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raise \$2-million for the centre and twinning of Alcott arena.

Halton MP Julian Reed praised Mold-Masters for giving so much to the "heart and soul" of the community and said the day belonged to Halton Hills.

"Now that it (the funding) is here, we can all breathe a sigh of relief, but we all look forward now to the challenge of actually seeing it come to fruition," Reed said.

Halton MPP Ted

Chudleigh echoed the praise for Mold-Masters and in a press release said it was "wonderful to see the federal government cooperating with the Ontario government on funding for this project which will directly affect the lives of so many people in North Halton."

Ward Two Councillor Joan Robson, speaking on behalf of Mayor Gastle who is in Europe, said the project will offer more than recreational benefits.

"This project will improve

the economic health of our community in helping to attract new business, provide tourism and cultural opportunities, and of course, create new jobs," Robson said, thanking the government officials for "making our dream possible."

Mold-masters spokesman Craig Renwick said company shareholders decided three years ago to support the Town's commitment to developing the leisure centre and second ice pad and thanked everyone who gave "so generously of their time and money to make this project a success."

In prepared remarks, COA Andrews thanked those who helped the Town and community partners "take a giant step today to enhance the quality of life in Halton Hills."

"I believe the recreation centre will create a place that gives our community its heart, its character, and contribute to our identity," Andrews said.

Along with the Canada-Ontario Infrastructure Program money, the Town will use \$2-million from fundraising, development charges, reserve funds, budget surpluses and borrowed money resulting in a tax increase, to pay for the recreation centre on Eighth Line at Argyll Road.

It will include a six-lane pool competitive pool, a therapeutic pool, sauna and leisure pool with a waterslide, change rooms, banquet hall, offices and meeting room on Town property on the Eighth Line and Argyll Road.

Andrews said they would tender the project as soon as possible and hope to open the centre next year.

## Four Karate competitors win Jiu Jitsu medals

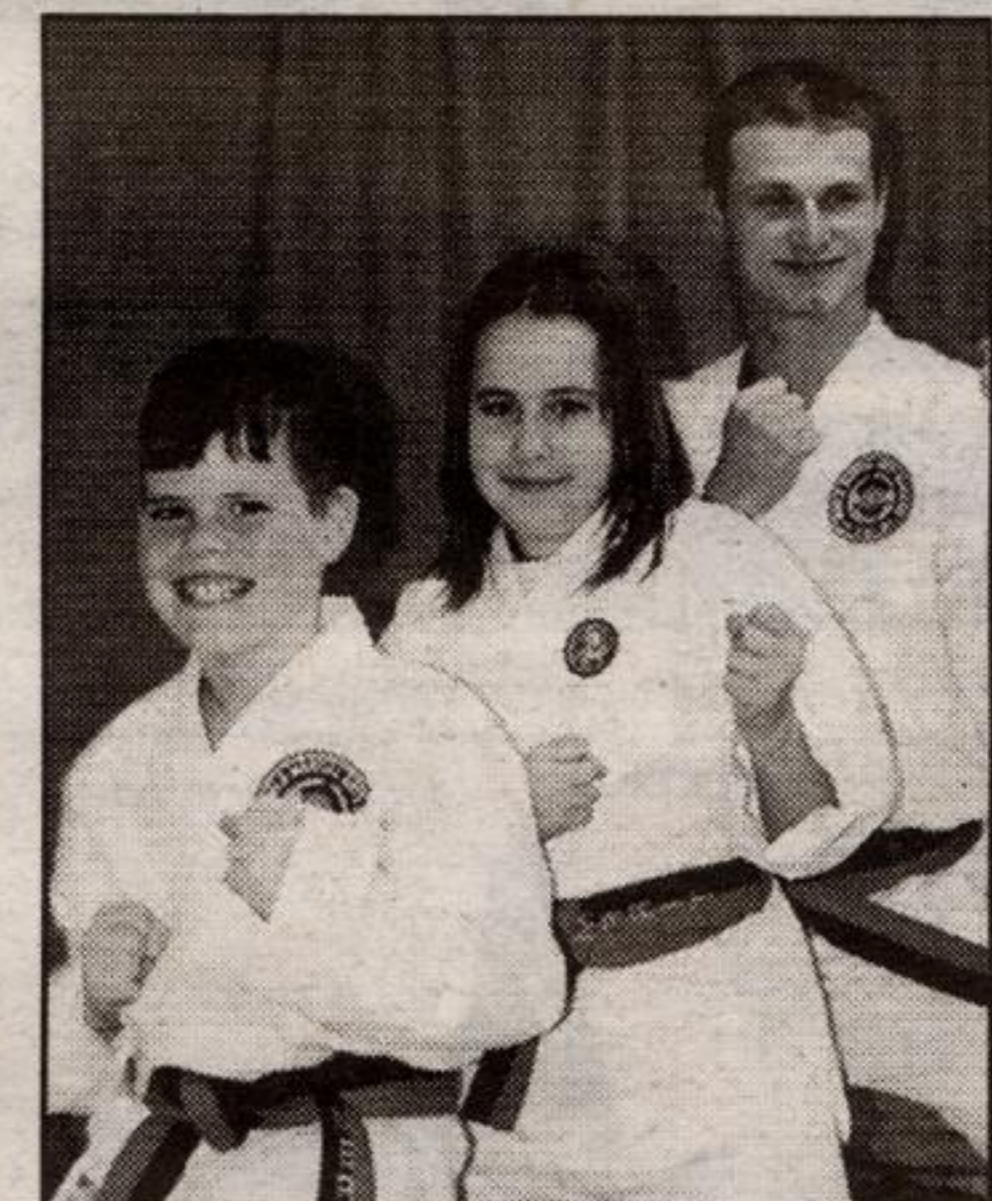
