Almost 65% of vehicles fail OPP safety test

Wellington OPP conducted a joint venture with the Ministry of Transportation on a oneday vehicle inspection on Thursday, May 9 in Elora.

Centre Wellington COP Committee as part of their 2002 Road Safety Challenge organized the Remove-A-Wreck Day event, in an effort to make Wellington County a safer place to drive

Officers identified 39 vehicles that did not appear to be mechanically safe to be operated on the roadways in Wellington County. The drivers were then issued with a reportion notice to attend the inspection station.

Of the 34 vehicles inspected, 22 were found to be unsafe and
