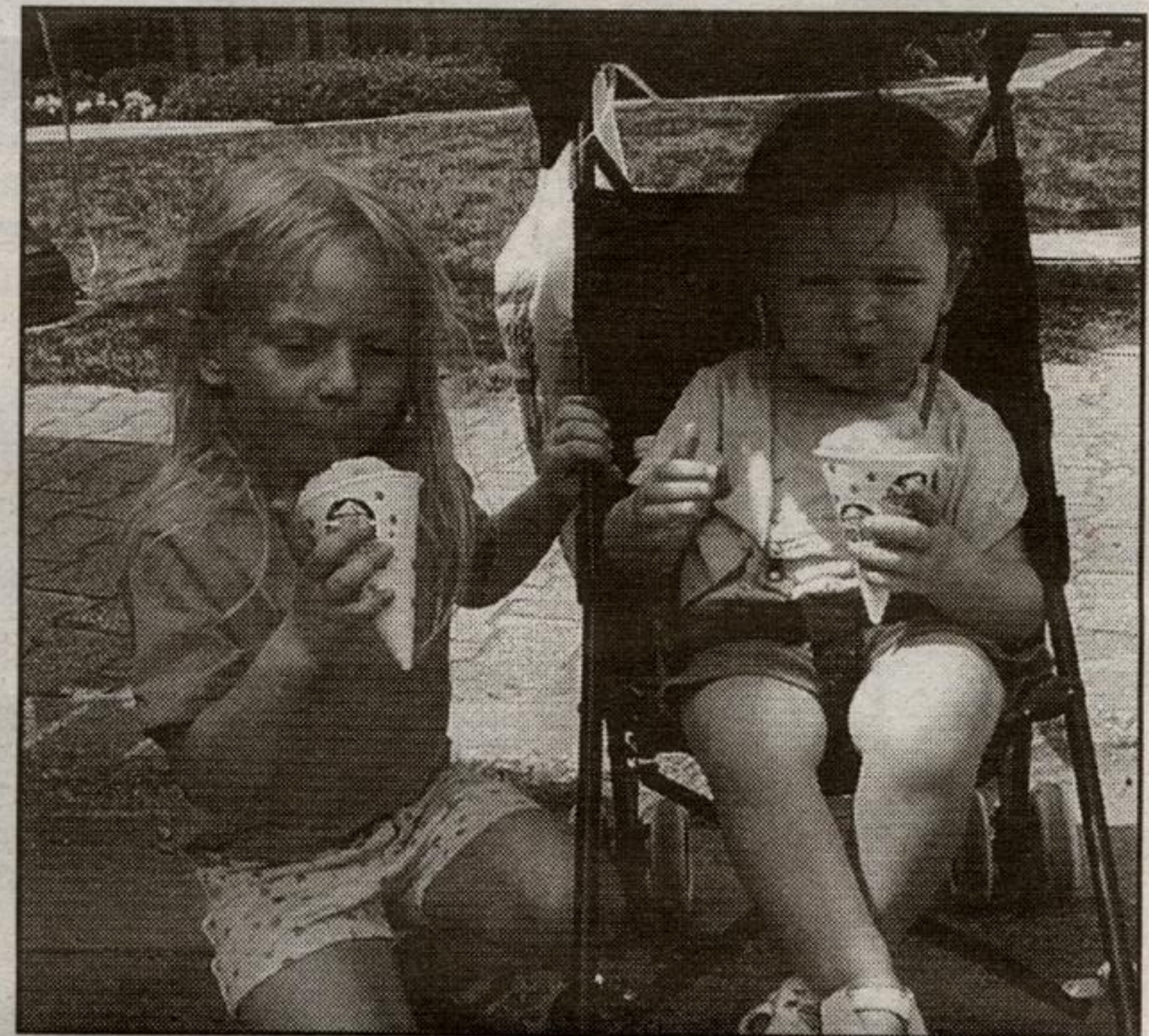
THOUSANDS JAM MILL: Thousands of people jam Mill St. From Main to the CN tracks

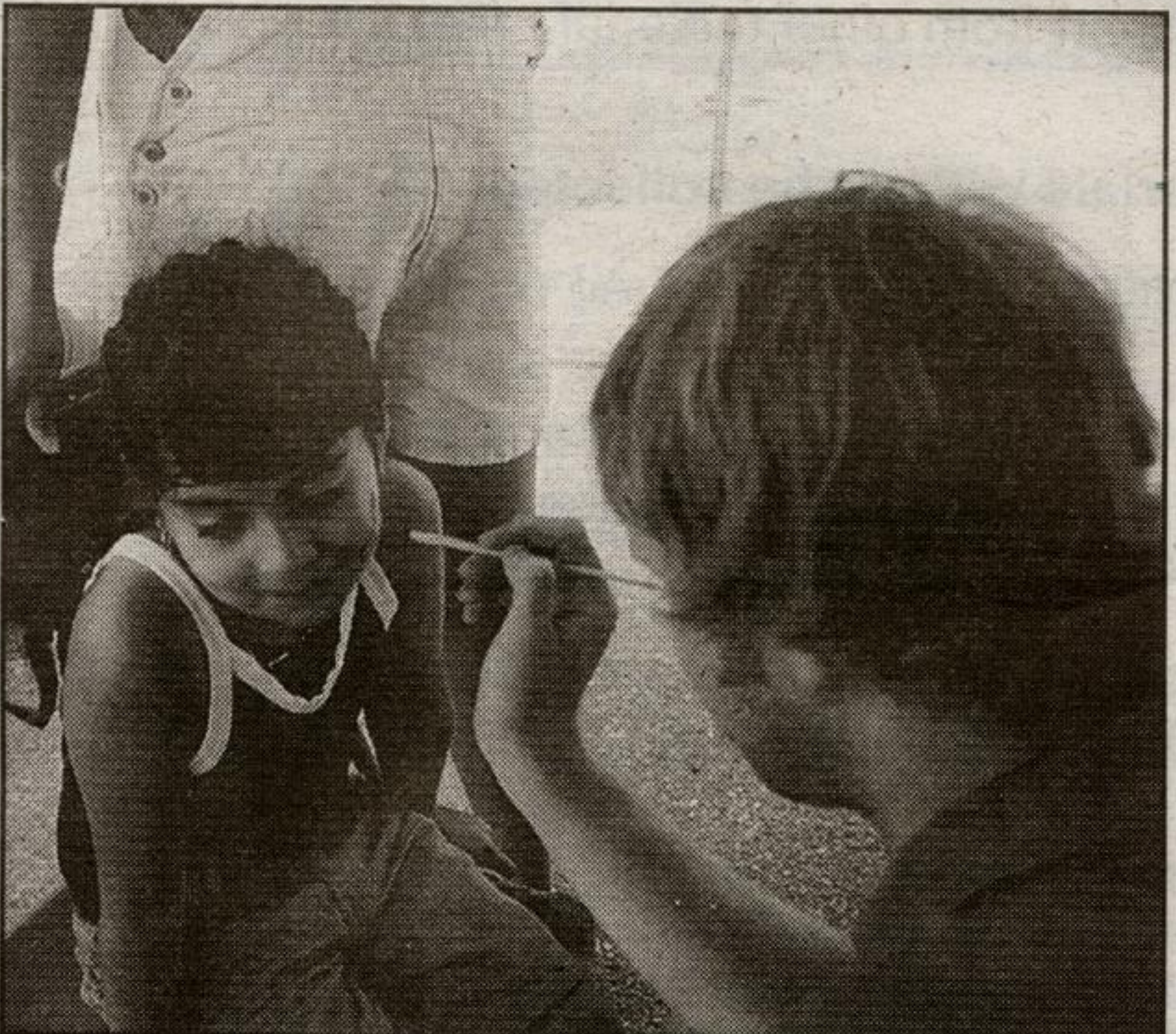
COOL TREATS: Jessica Krause, 4, and her sister Danielle, 22 months, found a great way to be the heat with icy cold snow cones.



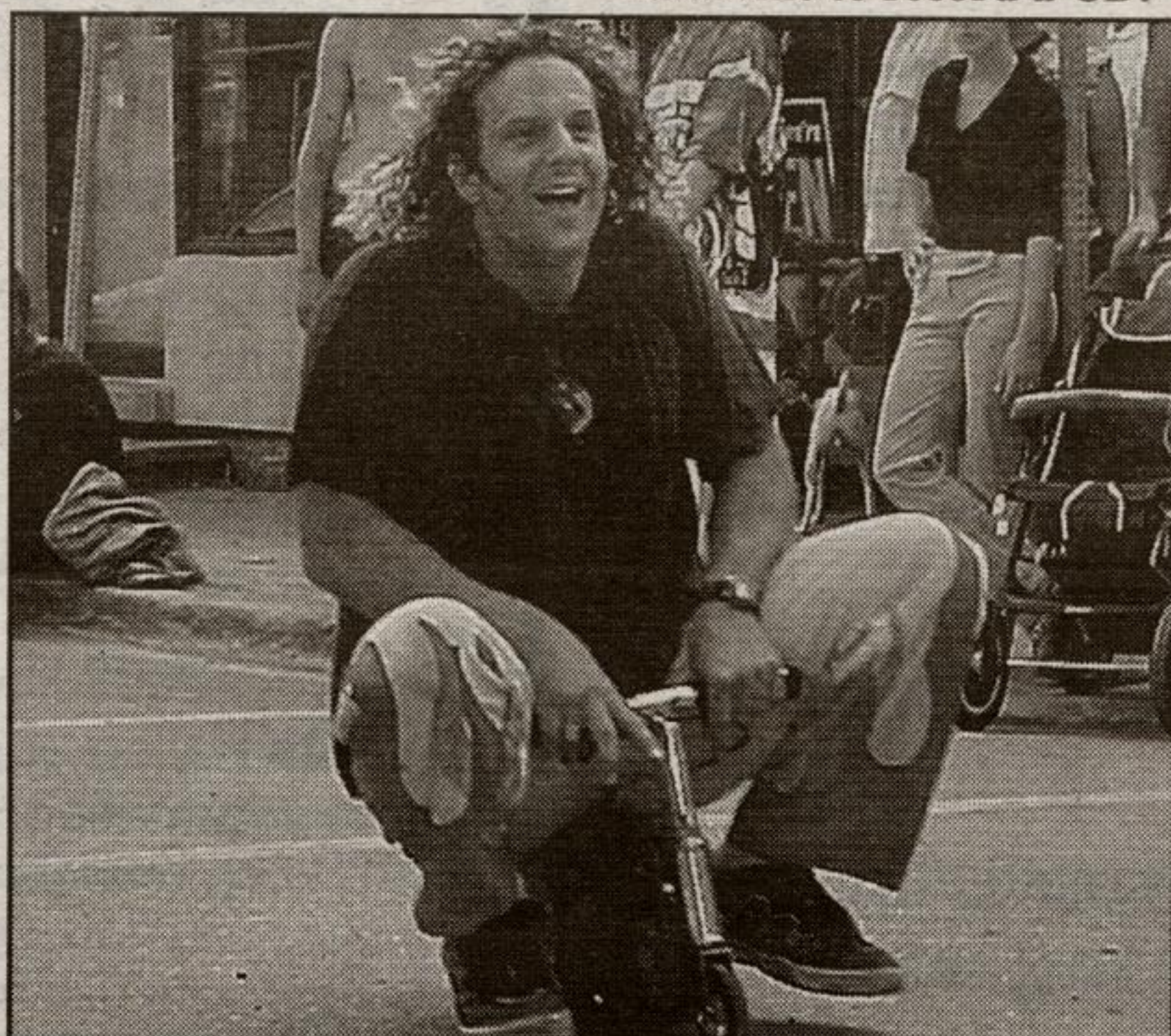
UNIQUELY ODD: Another crowd favourite, street busker Truly Odd from Hamilton wowed kids and adults with his many talents including fire eating.



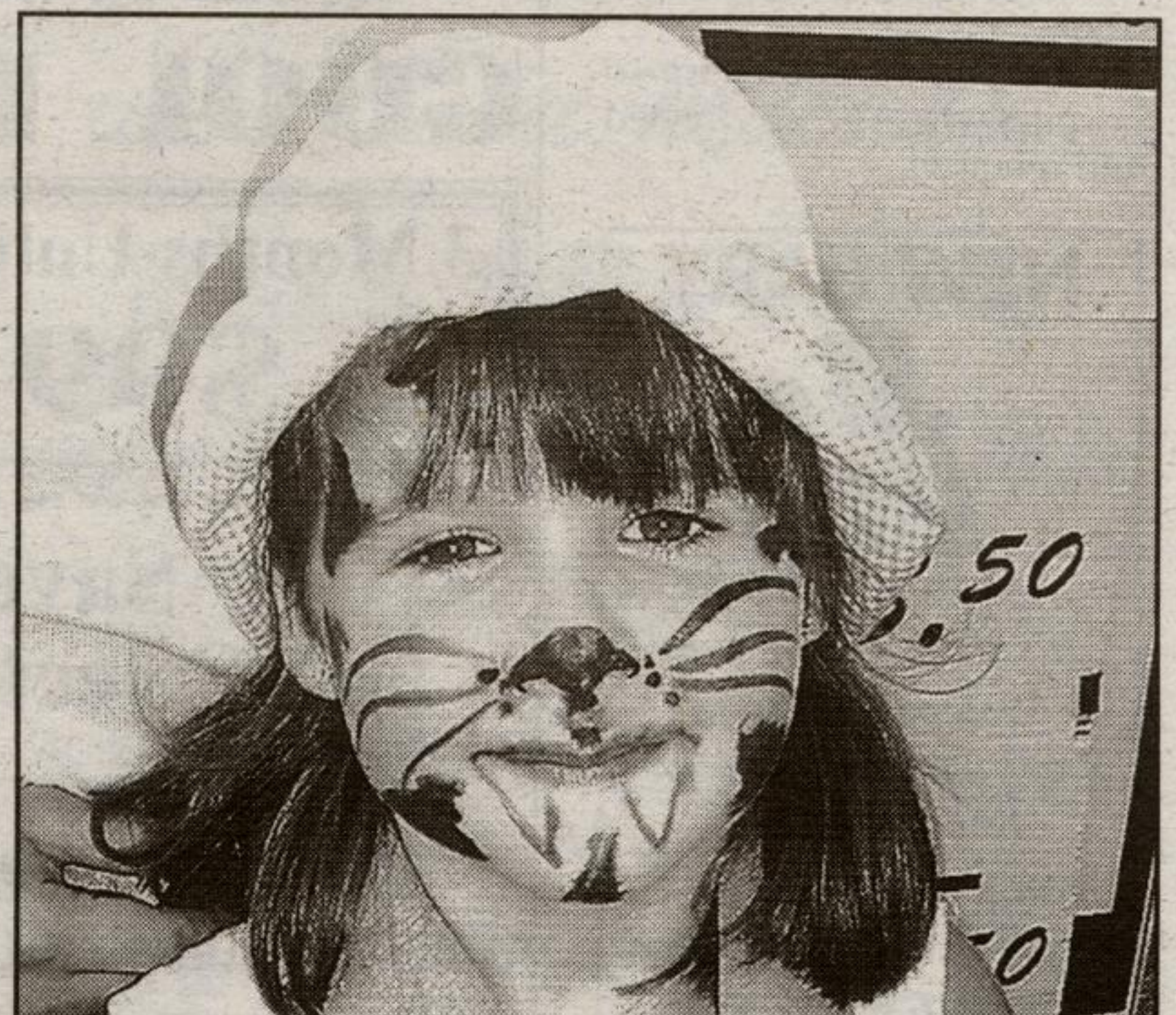
