Ostrichfest support



An echo of hate

Baby Boomers will remember the 60's anti-war song "Where have all the flowers gone; Long time passing; Where have all the flowers gone; Long long ago." Try to hold that melody close as you read this column.

Do these names sound familiar?

The names may be lost in the 'mists of time' but you know how they died. Thirty years ago today, during the Olympic Games in Munich, these Israeli athletes and coaches were abducted and slaughtered by terrorists supporting the Palestinian cause. Five of the dead were athletes, six were coaches or referees protecting the other young men with their lives. None wanted to die; all were heroic. If not for their calm and defiant actions that day the madmen may well have killed scores more.

While the Israeli deaths were a tragedy, (I shed no tears for the terrorists who were killed) a larger calamity was forthcoming because we learned so little from this murderous action.


The western world (excluding Israel) basically did nothing. A month later a Lufthansa jet was hijacked by terrorists demanding the Munich murderers be set free. Germany capitulated and set the five killers free.

The terrorist leaders must have been amazed and emboldened by the lack of resolve to defend our society. They were probably amazed when we began to relegate our God to legislated obscurity. They, on the other hand, considered their religion a shield, their God an ally. As the years went by the terrorist became more confident. Were the events of last September 11 a direct result of our laissez faire attitude 30 years ago? I wonder.

In Munich, the terrorists struck at 4:30am. Five killers scaled a six foot, six inch security fence and joined three fellow assassins already inside. Who were those three? Who supplied their accreditation? We were never told.

By 5:00am the Israelis were captured and coach Weinberg and Weightlifter Joseph Romano had been murdered. By 9:30am the terrorists had demanded the release of 234 German and Palestinian criminals. The world was shocked by the image of ski-masked terrorists on the residence balcony.

The Canadian team was in an adja-



cent building. They, and many other athletes, were quarantined in quarters while the drama played out yards away. Thankfully, all our people escaped safe and sound. A neighbour, who was there, told me that we probably knew more about what was going on than the Canadian team did. While secure in their building, they had no access to the TV reports we saw.

The negotiations went on all day. Israeli Prime Minister Golda Meir refused to capitulate to terrorist demands. Eventually, plans were agreed upon to transport the terrorists and hostages to a nearby airport by bus and helicopter. There, a plane would take them to Cairo where the Israelis were supposed to be released. The chopper arrived at the airport around 10:30pm. The German police launched a poorly planned rescue attempt, which went terribly wrong. When the shooting stopped, five of the eight terrorists were dead along with one German police officer and all nine hostages. ABC sportscaster Jim McKay told an unbelieving world "They're all

After a day of mourning IOC President Avery Brundage declared "the games must go on." The decision was very controversial. One American journalist wrote, "it was like having a dance at Dachau." In hindsight, Brundage made the right decision. We cannot/must not allow madmen to destroy our way of life. Sadly, we had to rally again against a slaughter of innocents 29 years and six days after the Munich massacre.

While the western world tut-tutted the Munich attack, Israeli PM Golda Meir made other plans. First, a massive land and air attack was launched against Palestinian targets in Lebanon and Syria. Meir, and senior officials, also decided to assassinate all individuals involved – directly or indirectly – in the Munich attack. This response was intended to bring justice to the murderers and give pause to those who would consider such actions in the future.

Over the next six years the Mossad (Israeli Intelligence Agency) pursued the criminals relentlessly. By then only one of the Munich terrorists remained

alive. If he's not deceased by now, one only has to recall the dogged determination Israel demonstrated when tracking down WWII war criminals to know this killer lives every day in fear. The operation was known as the Wrath of God. Sounds appropriate.

In some ways, the Americans are sending the same message to terrorists by pursuing them wherever they skulk. However, I see reluctance coming into the attitudes of many western leaders. Are we going to become complacent, like we did in 1972? Will we allow the appeasers to carry the day? Or, will we join the Americans in ferreting out those who would destroy us, no matter where the hole they are hiding in is? The signals from Ottawa would indicate the former.

If, in the minds of some, that makes me a warmonger, then so be it. Namecalling won't hurt me but bombs will kill my children, my friends, my countrymen. Todd Beamer said it all on a doomed plane over Pennsylvania; "Let's roll!"

In 1999 a member of Yassar Arafat's PLO, Mr. Mohammed Auda, also known as Abu Daoud, confirmed in his autobiography that Yasser Arafat saw him off on the Munich mission. Black September was obviously a faction of the PLO. Abu Daoud claimed Arafat was briefed in advance of the Munich massacre. Mr Daoud was, until recently, a member of the Palestinian National Council. Last month it was reported, and confirmed by the Palestinians, that Mr. Daoud committed suicide. Evidently he shot himself – several times.

I wonder which side got him? But then, who cares?

There was an eerie precursor to the New York tragedy associated with the Munich massacre. A British documentary on the Olympic murders was aired on HBO in the United States. The program was on for 95 minutes. The documentary titled "One Day in September" was televised on Monday, September 11, 2000. No-one took warning.

As we approach the first anniversary of the cowardly murders of almost 3,000 people, including 24 Canadians, I think of that day 30 years ago and wonder; was last year's blast an echo from Munich?

The last words of "Flowers" haunt

"Where have all the young men gone? Gone to graveyards every one. When will they ever learn, when will they ev-er learn?"
