Emiry said while "there are some environmental fencing issues" the program was never discussed with Oakes because they saw the dispute as a "line fence issue." He is still working with the two men.

"Neither party was particularly satisfied (with the decision)," Emiry said. "I hope we are going to get a resolution. I felt we were moving to a reasonable conclusion in our last two discussions."

Loney also questions the wisdom of bringing in equipment to clear trees on the line designated by the fence viewers because that equipment is likely to get stuck in the swamp. He questioned whether this will require a tree cutting permit. John Benham, who oversees tree cutting permits under Wellington County's bylaw, couldn't provide an immediate answer. Certain government purposes are exempt under the bylaw and since the fence has been ordered under a municipal committee, it might be eligible for exemption. Benham said he'd want a legal opinion on the matter since this is the first time the question has been raised. Sheppard said the issue, including the tribunal hearing, "could still go away" if the two men can reach an amicable agreement and sign it before the hearing.
