My 42nd cousin (or whatever) and reunion organizer Wayne Morrison tells me he has always wanted to get the family together because he wondered where the family descendants went when they left Glengarry. So instead of celebrating the new Millennium, Wayne opted to celebrate the Morrison family's bicentennial.

Growing up as the only member of my family who seemed to have any curiosity about our background, I always thought of myself as sort of different. From the number of relatives who showed up, incomplete family trees in hand, it appears I'm not alone in my quest to figure us all out. Only 100 of us attended but we came from all over, -California, British Columbia, Manitoba, various parts of Ontario and Virginia. Still more relatives on the east coast were tracked down but couldn't make it.

I think the greatest achievement of the whole thing was finding partners in our search. Wayne wants to do a book on the family such as already exists for other Scottish families who migrated to Glengarry by the boat load. I wish him luck.
